STRICTLY TABOO

Mayor of Niagara Falls Says
Anyone Attempting It will
Break the Law.

Niagara Falls, Ont., April 3—With the
link hardly dry on Mayor Maxwell M.
Thompson's published statement that no
official permit will be granted to Miss
Eleanora Yelding, 17 years old, of Eng-
land, to erect a cable across the lower
Niagara gorge and walk across it as an
exhibition stunt, the mall brought to the
mayor another application for permis-
sion to perform the "Blondin act".
Miss Yelding some weeks ago wrote
the mayor from Hamilton, Ont., asking
for the permit. The letter was filed
without making reply. Next the Cleve-
land tourist bureau wrote Secretary
Green of the Falls Chamber of Com-
merce in behalf of Miss Yelding's pro-
posed exploit. It was then that the
mayor expressed himself in opposition
to such hazardous exploit. The next
letter received by Mayor Thompson is
dated "Niagara Falls, 48 Fuller avenue,
Toronto, Canada," and is signed by
James E. Hardy. It asks permission to
repeat his performance of 1896.
The mayor sent a reply to Mr. Hardy
by mail. In his letter the mayor advises

COD LIVER OIL ON TAP

Free Distribution Brings Joy to Child-
ren of Moscow.

Moscow, April 4—The "cod liver oil
man," is the latest addition to the pic-
turesque sights of Moscow's streets for
which the American Relief Administra-
tion is responsible. After the fashion
of the once-familiar milk man, he drives
around daily a huge cask mounted on a
truck, his route including all the day
nurseries and children's homes.

He has no need to cry his wares, for
the authorities are on the outlook for
him, and come with pails which they fill
under the spigot, with never a thought
of the "price," for there is no charge.

The reports of the relief administra-
tion, however, make no mention of the
children's "delight" at the sight of the
truck or of their gratitude to the kind
Americans for this particular form of
relief.

Medicines and other supplies are dis-
tributed to the hospitals and nurseries
in the same manner. The total value of
these supplies given out by the admin-
istration throughout Russia is set at \$7-
600,000.
