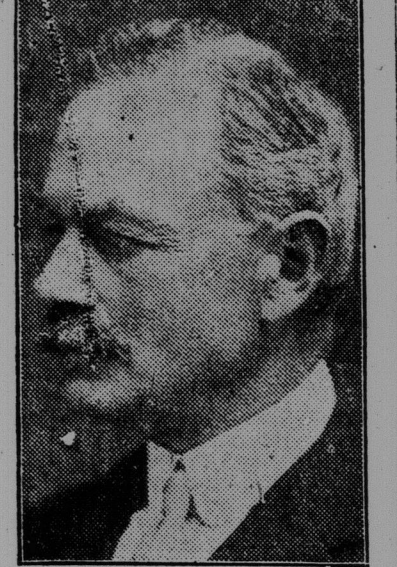

EIGHT BATTLESHIPS FOR GREAT BRITAIN

London, Aug. 15—Great Britain is planning eight gigantic battleships, the most powerful in the world, the Daily Sketch declares.

These craft, four of which were said to be provided in this year's estimates and four for next year, were described as radical departures from anything now afloat.

The ships, according to the newspaper, will be nearly 1,000 feet long, will have a displacement of 30,000 tons and a speed of thirty-five knots. The four provided for this year will carry nine 16-inch guns, while those in next year's budget will be armed with 18-inch guns, the most powerful naval ordnance yet attempted.

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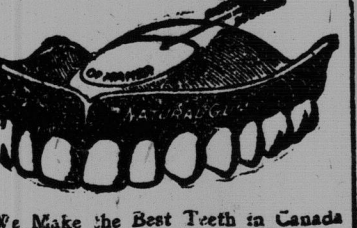

PUBLIC HEALTH SUPERVISION

No Less Than 1,318 Patients at End of July at Halifax Health Centre.

(Halifax Chronicle.)

The monthly report of the Health Centre's work just presented the Massachusetts-Halifax Health Commission by the Chief Nurse states that 564 nursing and medical consultations were held in the various Health Centre clinics during July. Of these 141 were in the Child Welfare and Prenatal Division; 119 in the Ear, Nose and Throat Division; 114 in the Venereal Disease clinic conducted by the Provincial Health Department; 2 in the special Psychopathic clinic for the disaster injured; (the Preschool Age Dental clinic was closed for a holiday during July, hence no attendance); 90 in the Nutrition clinic; 112 in the Tuberculosis clinic; 4 in the Eye clinic of Health Centre No. 2, Dartmouth; 175 in the special Psychopathic clinic for the disaster injured.

Out of 177 admissions during July, 106 were from families with no previous public health contact. One hundred and ninety-nine families from Health Centre No. 1, Dartmouth, and 106 from Health Centre No. 2, Dartmouth, are being visited where no medical contact is had at the Health Centre. Many of these contacts are at the request of the family physician.

During July 64 prescriptions were filled by chemists connected with the Health Centre clinics. The public health field nurses made a total of 2481 instructional visits to the homes of patients of Halifax and Dartmouth during July; 1,947 of these visits being made by the public health nurses associated with the Health Centre in Halifax and 534 by those associated with the Health Centre in Dartmouth.

Two hundred and twenty-four children were admitted to the Dalhousie Dispensary during July, where a total of 915 fillings were inserted, 486 were treated, 122 pulp capped and 303 extractions were made.

In addition to the regular work of the Health Centre some medical and nursing staffs were given to the organization of a Day Camp conducted on the grounds of Health Centre No. 1, by the Health Centre staffs. Forty special examinations were made, 18 on children sent for this specific reason; 22 on the staffs of the various clinics conducted by the commission's staffs; 22 on the staffs of the various clinics conducted by the commission's staffs.

A STRANGE HABIT  
Wealthy Frenchman Has a Mania for Stealing Boilers—Some Weigh More Than a Ton.

Orleans, France, July 29—A few nights ago burglars broke into an ironmonger's warehouse and the next morning the only object missing was a large boiler. The police at first believed the theft to be the work of a madman. Later they arrested Mr. Botier, a wealthy wholesale wine merchant and owner of a chateau and extensive grounds at Cerdon-sur-Loire.
