Ottawa, Dec. 21—On the ground that

VILA APPEALS TO

Washington, Dec. 22—Francisco Villa,
once the leading Mexican rebel leader,

Huerta government last summer and re-
turned to a large estate at Cuatitlan in
Durango, given him by the government
has complained to resident Obregon that
bandits robbed him of 200 head of
horses.

Vila asks for more adequate protec-
tion from marauding bands.
Toronto, Dec. 22—In the annual state-
ment of the Canadian Bank of Com-
merce, which will hold its annual meet-
ing here on January 11, a marked ex-
pansion is shown in the net profits for
the twelve months ended November 30,
1920, the total being \$3,306,243.97, the
largest in the bank's history, and an in-
crease of \$281,851, or 12.2 per cent, over
the previous year's net profits.

The bank's earnings for the last year
are the largest in record, exceeding
those of 1919, the best pre-war year, by
\$331,292. The amount available for dis-
tribution was \$4,735,919, but of this sum
\$1,800,000 was paid in dividends and
\$150,000 by way of a one per cent bonus
payable December 1, 1919.

OPEN COMPETITION
PLAN FOR FUTURE

Break Up of Mason Contract-
ors' Association Announced
at "Building Trust" Inquiry

New York, Dec. 22—Because of revela-
tions before the joint legislative com-
mittee investigating the "building
trusts," Thomas Kennedy, president of
the Stone Masons' Contractors' Associa-
tion, announced today that the association
would disband and dissolve its corpora-
tion at once. He said the members of
the organization will meet on next
Thursday to take this action.

"Of course, we can't promise you im-
munity for this volunteer action," re-
marked Mr. Untermyer, the committee's
counsel.

The association, Mr. Kennedy as-
serted, will also abrogate an agreement
with the Stone Masons' Union, which
provides that the union cannot furnish
workmen to non-member mason con-
tractors.

"We will now take the field in open
competition," declared the head of the
association, who admitted on the wit-
ness stand earlier in the day that the
organization had established fixed prices
for stone and concrete work. He said
that the mason contractors had formed
the combination in order to "make a liv-
ing," but asserted there had been no
profiteering.

REPORT PLOT
FOR REVOLUTION

Prague, Dec. 22—A detailed plan of
a projected revolutionary movement, has
been found among papers of agitators at
Kladno, fifteen miles northwest of
Prague, according to the Narodni Listy.

The newspaper says the plan provided
for the creation of a communist minis-
try and the establishment of workers'
councils.

Highly compromising correspondence
also is said to have been found showing
that the Czech-Slovak communists are
in constant touch with those in Ger-
many, Hungary, Italy, Russia, the
United States and China.

AGED MAN KILLED BY
TRAIN IN NOVA SCOTIA

Pictou, N. S., Dec. 22—James Rob-
inson, eighty-seven years old, while walk-
ing on the track near W-lace station
yesterday morning, was killed by the
Short Line express.

He was warned by the whistle and
stepped off the track to allow the train
to pass, but again stepped on the track
and was killed.
