Report Sale of Red Sox—Later Denied.
Chicago, March 28—The Boston Red Sox will be sold to a syndicate of Boston and New York men, according to a report coming from inside American League circles in this city. The information state that the report is well vouched for.

It is also stated that Clarence Rowland, former manager of the White Sox, will be the pilot for the Red Sox under the new deal.

New York, March 28—When asked about the report from Chicago that the Red Sox would be sold to a syndicate of Boston and New York men, Harry Frazee said today there was no truth whatever in the report, and that no such proposition had ever been made to him.

Fans Eager at Cleveland.
Cleveland, O., March 28—All records for requests for reserved seats for the opening baseball game at League Park here have been broken, according to E. S. Bernard, business manager of the Cleveland American League Club. He said today that more than five thousand box and reserved seats for the inaugural game between Cleveland and St. Louis, April 14 are sold.

Backing the Giants.
New York, March 28—Sporting men on Broadway are backing the Giants heavily to beat the champion Reds out of the National League pennant. They seem to think that the Reds will be overconfident and that McGraw's reconstructed infield will deliver the goods. For American League honors the Clevelanders are in much favor among betting men, who predict that the runners up will be the Tigers and Yankees.

FOOTBALL.
Inter-provincial Rugby.
Montreal, March 28—At the annual meeting of the Inter-provincial Rugby Union on Saturday changing the playing rules was the most important business. A copy of the amended rules will be gone through by the inter-provincial executive for final decision. The great change in the college game is to the rule governing offside play.

Newcastle May Come.
Toronto, March 28—Newcastle United may join Canada this coming summer, despite contradictory reports, according to Secretary Edward Spencer of the Dominion of Canada Football Association. He said on Saturday that he had received a communication from Con Jones, who is in England, to the effect that the Newcastle United football team would accept the Dominion Football Association's invitation if the Canadian tour could be managed in six weeks. He had been empowered by the D. F. A. council, on a telegraphic vote, he said, to arrange such a schedule and cable to Newcastle. He said he had done this.

H. L., announced yesterday that the winners would receive \$300.00 each and the losers \$225.00 each. Thirty per cent. of the receipts went to the Arena management for rental, and ten per cent. to the two leagues. There were 15,300 paid admissions.

GOLF.
A Blind Golfer.
London, Eng., March 28—Perhaps the most remarkable triumph over blindness yet achieved is that of a V. C. officer who can still play golf. He goes on the course accompanied by his wife, and his ball is tied for him by a caddy. His wife assists him to get his feet into exactly the right position. The caddy then rings a tiny bell over the ball so as to indicate to the player's acute hearing the exact spot at which he must aim. On the green he relies also upon touch.

ATHLETIC.
The Olympics.
Antwerp, March 28—King Albert of the Belgians, who is taking a keen interest in the Olympic games, has called upon authorities between this city and the stadium to repair all roads so that the people can attend the great athletic meet. This district is still showing the effect of the German bombardment. Slating teams from France, Finland, Sweden, Norway, Italy, Switzerland, England and Belgium are entered for the ice events.

A KINGDOM BUT WITHOUT A KING
That Is Virtually Position of Hungary — Division as to Choice of Monarch.
Budapest, March 28—Hungary is virtually a kingdom without a king but there is tacit observance of the former monarchical constitution. All parties are agreed on the question of a monarchy, but they show divergence as to who should be king. In order to avoid serious trouble, therefore, the parties are disposed to postpone the election until conditions are more settled.
The farmers' party, which is against the return of the Hapsburgs, has adopted a resolution for a motion in the national assembly that propaganda in favor of any candidate at the present time will be declared an act of conspiracy and punished accordingly.
The state officers and the army will take the oath to the constitution and swear allegiance to the regent on Easter Sunday.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES
It is believed in Europe that Germany is evading the terms of the peace treaty with respect to munitions and armaments. The inter-allied commission have found more than the permitted number of field guns and airplanes near Berlin.
At Amherst, N. S., on Saturday, the preliminary examination of M. A. Peel, charged with manslaughter through negligence in causing fire at Oxford, N. S., was begun. The trial has to do with the death of Lewis A. King.
An increase in the head tax to \$9.20 and a ten per cent. increase on fares has been decided by the Canadian Railway companies on travel to the United States from Canadian points.
Rev. A. Sutherland has been inducted as pastor of the Presbyterian church, Chipman, N. B.
The Sheriff of Dorchester, N. B., is critically ill at his home.
The steamer Holmwood, is discharging a cargo at Halifax consisting almost entirely of eighteen-pounder guns, the property of Canada. Some airplanes are also in the cargo.
William Pomeroy and Jesse C. Scott were held without bail for the grand jury Saturday at the conclusion of a preliminary hearing of charges that they murdered Robert Moore, formerly of Westmorland county, at Greenville on March 13.
