### EXPLANATION IN JUSTICE TO PATRIOTIC FUND COMMITTEE

There has been some talk and some criticism of the Patriotic Fund committee in connection with the case of a woman who recently fainted on the ferry boat, as a result of hunger and weakness, and whose husband had enlisted. The truth is that the man did not report the condition of his family nor did his wife communicate with the committee. They knew nothing of the case until the woman left home one morning without any breakfast and fainted on the ferry boat. The moment the committee heard of it prompt action was taken.

The committee is doing excellent work and the fund is being administered most carefully, with a desire to do the fullest justice in every case.

### CASE SETTLED OUT OF COURT

The case of James McKay vs. John H. Crandall et al. of the trial of which was commenced yesterday afternoon in the circuit court before Chief Justice Landry and a jury, was amicably settled out of court today. This was a suit brought to recover about \$6,000 as damages for lumber cut by the defendants on lands near St. Martins, claimed by the plaintiffs. The case was settled by the defendants relinquishing all claims to the lumber cut. Each party is to pay its own costs. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., and Francis Kerr appeared for the plaintiff, and M. G. Teed, K. C., and Austin A. Allen of Moncton for the defendants.


