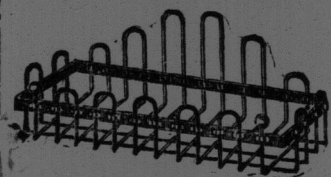

## DO NOT WANT ENGLAND TO LOSE HER RADIUM SUPPLY

Japan Bids For it and Hospital Doctors Say it Should Not be Sold Out of Country

London, April 3.—While the great London hospitals which employ radium for the treatment of cancer and other diseases are making pitiful appeals for adequate supplies of the beneficent element, the country is now threatened with the loss of practically all the available radium not actually in constant use.

These supplies consist of 500 milligrammes, now lying idle in a London safe. Japan is now applying for this radium for purposes undisclosed. Unless some one comes forward with the radium, it is probable that there is a general apprehension that the radium, with an additional 300 milligrammes, that will be ready soon, will go abroad. All that is wanted is a sum of between \$40,000 and \$50,000.

Dr. Leonard Barlow, the director of the Cancer Research Laboratories of the Middlesex Hospital, says:—

"The great majority of our unfortunate patients have to die simply because we do not possess sufficient radium to relieve their pain, if not, in a good proportion of cases, to effect a probable cure."

"Owing to the small amount of radium at our disposal our energies on behalf of our patients are painfully restricted. On the other hand, it would be difficult to overstate the benefit that would be derived by many suffering from pain and inoperable cancer if 500 milligrammes were forthcoming. But I believe we could easily use 1,000 milligrammes every hour of the twenty-four. All we need is the radium, or the money to purchase it without delay."

"The 500 milligrammes referred to are at the present moment lying in the safe of the British Radium Corporation. The radium is not actually purchased yet by Japan," said one of the directors, "and if any British committee is formed to obtain it, as well as further supplies, for hospital use, I am sure the directors would be only too delighted to grant every possible facility. We have been selling our radium at \$100 a milligramme, but if it were designed for hospital purposes I have no doubt, a substantial reduction would be made."

## PRINCE TO LEARN TO FARM IN ENGLAND

Copenhagen, April 3.—Prince Erik of Denmark, the third son of Prince Waldemar, and nephew of Queen Alexandra, is going to England to make a prolonged stay at a farm near Oxford, where he will continue his agricultural training. He has been studying practical farming in Denmark, and it is with the idea of further enlarging his experience that he now proposes to study the methods and routine of an English model farm.

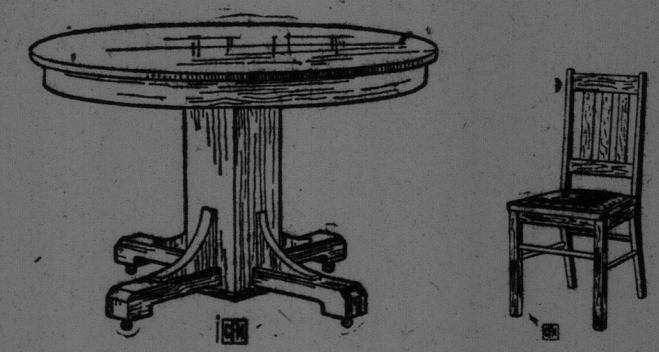
