FIRST SNOW TODAY
Just a Little, But Two Weeks Earlier Than Last Year

St. John had its first real taste of winter this morning when snow began falling about 10:30 o'clock. It came steadily but not heavily, just enough to remind the people that the good old summer time was no more. Last year the first snow here was on Nov. 13, so those who have predicted an early winter seem to be on the right track. Montreal had a small snow storm this morning also. Reports from Halifax are to the effect that the first snow fell there about two weeks ago.

The lowest temperature in St. John this morning was 38 degrees. The probabilities for tomorrow are cooler weather, with a few scattered showers.

LITTLE GIRL'S BURNS CAUSED HER DEATH

Keen sympathy is being felt for Mr. and Mrs. F. W. McCaw, of Rockland Road, in the death of their little daughter, Muriel, this morning from injuries sustained about two weeks ago, when she was badly burned while playing with matches. She was a twin daughter, and a bright little child of three years. Besides her parents, there are three sisters and one brother, at home.

The accident occurred on Saturday, two weeks ago tomorrow, quite early in the morning, when she managed to get some matches unburned to her mother. In the woodshed she was playing with them when her clothing caught, and before the flames could be extinguished by her mother, she had been seriously and seriously burned. The funeral will take place from the home of her parents, 218 Rockland Road, on Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

THE EXCHEQUER COURT

The case of the King vs. The Minto Land Company was continued before Judge Cassels in the Exchequer Court this morning. It is expected that the taking of evidence will be finished this afternoon. Several witnesses were examined, including George P. Gardiner, building inspector for Moncton who gave evidence in reference to the building of cottages. Thomas Williams, chairman of the Moncton Board of Assessors told of the method of assessing the property under the assessment Act and the valuations placed upon the land in question. General Taylor, county secretary for Westmorland gave the valuation of the property in 1911 and 1910.

John Winter gave evidence in reference to his own property.

AGREEMENT OVER POWER

Hydro Electric Company and Council Sub-Committee Have Come to Terms

An agreement has been reached between the New Brunswick Hydro Electric Company and the members of the sub-committee of the council to whom their proposals to enter the city were referred. The agreement gives the company the right to enter the city, erect poles, etc., and carry on business here and in return the company makes certain concessions in regard to rates.

It is understood that the terms of the agreement provide for a substantial reduction in the rates to all consumers, large and small, for both power and illuminating purposes.

The terms have been submitted to the company and approved by them and the next step will be to lay the agreement before the council for ratification. If the council approves, it was said today, the company will be in a position to go ahead at once and it is understood that it is their intention to waste no time preparing to enter the city once the agreement is signed.

THE WATER TROUBLE IN FERNHILL CEMETERY

Directors and Alderman Make Inspection, But no Result—May Be More Definite Action

Another attempt to investigate the origin of the leak in the water main running through Fernhill was made a few days ago but nothing further has been done.

Hon. J. G. Forbes and G. S. Fisher on behalf of the directors of the cemetery company promised to lay another drain pipe to the water and sewerage board, paid a visit to Fernhill and went over the situation there in an effort to decide whether the water comes from a leak in the main or from some other source, but it was decided impossible to determine this definitely without uncovering the pipe line.

It is understood that the city engineer has promised to lay another drain pipe to carry off the surplus water, but the directors feel that this would not be enough. As winter is approaching rapidly, it was said today to be probable that the directors will take some more vigorous action than they have yet done if the source of trouble is not revealed and remedied promptly.

SHOULD BETS BE PAID OVER NOW?

Some Thousands of Dollars Tied up in St. John on Queens-Sunbury Election

There is a good deal of St. John money tied up in the Queens-Sunbury election in the form of bets on the result. When the declaration proceedings ended in the official announcement that Col. H. H. McLean was elected, it was expected by winners of bets that their money would be paid over, but there came the demand for a recount and with it hesitancy on the part of stake-holders as they feel they should await the result of the second counting.

Now the re-count is off and those interested are asking today does Judge Wilson's decision against the recount finally release the bet money. It is said that several thousands of dollars are thus tied up in St. John.

PICKED HIS MOOSE

Huntsman in St. John County Woods Came Upon a Herd of Seven

It does not frequently happen in any woods that there is presented to a sportsman the opportunity to take his choice from several moose, letting several pass by without firing a shot at them, and then to see a chance along, and then is "bagged." Such, however, happened yesterday in the woods near Seven Mile Lake, St. John county, when W. J. Hamilton, of Orlolo, Philippine Islands, brought down a fine big bull with a spread of 54 inches and fourteen points.

Mr. Hamilton has been visiting W. George Gray of Main street, for some time, and has been spending a little time on the latter's farm in the country. This week with Mr. Shaw of Lepreau as guide, he has been in the woods armed with a big game license and a rifle. Before he picked out his game, he had the novel sight of "looking them over" as they came upon a herd of seven moose. Only one of the lot was a cow.

Dr. McAlpine was summoned and attended to the injury. The skin was burned off the hand, and a part of the arm. The boy is getting along nicely, however.


