EMPRESS
CARGO BREAKS
THE RECORD

Close to \$900,000 is Value of Goods Aboard C. P. R. Liner Now on the Way to Liverpool

Cargo records for the port of St. John were sent skyward when the big C. P. R. liner Empress of Ireland sailed from this port on Friday last with one of the most valuable cargoes, if not the most valuable taken out of any port in Canada. Close to a million dollars of Canadian and foreign products are on board the steamer now on her way to Liverpool. The figures are \$822,821. Of this large amount \$322,848 is Canadian and \$500,000 foreign or American exports. The latter consist almost entirely of meats, while a large portion of the Canadian is meat and cheese. The value of two tons of Cobalt bar silver aboard is \$60,000, and another valuable shipment is 220 tons of nickel, copper matte from Sudbury, Ontario. This is en route to Swansea via Liverpool, and is used in the manufacture of armor plate. The largest cargo previously was that taken away by the Allan liner Grampan, which totalled something more than \$700,000. The export figures are continuing to roll up at a rapid rate and are certain to be in excess of last year.

John A. Sinclair Sells to Kerr Business College — School Board Was to Have Decided Tonight

The Bell property on the corner of Union street and Prince William street extension, known as "Hidden Hall," which was purchased a few days ago by John A. Sinclair, was sold today to the Kerr Business College. The price paid is understood to be \$10,000. Since Mr. Sinclair secured the property there have been several applications for it, among the applicants being the board of school trustees, the U. S. immigration agent and the present purchasers. The school trustees are to meet this evening and the principal business to come before them, was to have been the consideration of the purchase of the building, and it is said to have been probable. They would have decided to buy it as it is only one member of the board was opposed. The new owners of the Gallant building, where the board now has its offices, have notified practically all the tenants that their rent would be increased after May 1. This has led the school trustees into looking around for other quarters, and it is also the main reason for the business college deciding to secure a building of its own. It is understood that the building will be remodelled at once to suit the requirements of the college.

ST. JOHN SHOWS
GAIN OF 41 P. C.
Building in 1910 Much More Brisk Than in Previous Year — Halifax had a Falling Off

According to the figures published in February "Construction," St. John building construction in 1910 showed an increase of 41.7 per cent. over 1909, whereas Halifax showed a decrease of 23.7 per cent. Sydney, Cape Breton showed an increase of 116.58 per cent. The figures for St. John were—1909, \$328,500; 1910, \$473,273. St. John occupies the thirteenth position in the list of Canadian cities in point of increase in the year.

CONSTRUCTION SALES.
Official returns submitted from twenty-four cities located in every province and section of the Dominion record an aggregate total for permits issued, amounting to \$68,120,000, as against \$44,800,000 in the year of 1909. This represents an average gain of 45 per cent. or a volume of work nearly half again as great as was carried out in the preceding twelve months.

In the maritime provinces, both St. John and Sydney topped their previous figures, although Halifax is in the arrears by 23 per cent. St. John and Sydney's increase is 41 and 4 per cent. in order named, and the amounts noted show a steady and consistent growth, which quite represents the case in general.

PROBATE COURT
Will of Capt. C. W. Brannen Proved Today—Several Other Estates

In the probate court today the matter of the estate of Abraham T. Waters, ex-capt. of the 6th, came up. He died intestate, leaving a widow, two sons and three daughters. The residuary of the estate, Emily S. Waters, she was appointed administratrix. There is no real estate, personal estate \$460. Amos A. Wilson, K. C. is proctor.

The will of Charles Wesley Brannen, master mason, was proved. He died \$900 to each of his grand-daughters, Alice Maud Underdown and Irene, daughters of his son, Charles H. Brannen, Esq., daughter of his son, George P. Brannen, and Dorothy and Blanche Tapley, daughter of Frederick W. Tapley. The rest of his property he gives to his four children, Charles H. and George P. Brannen, Emma, wife of Frederick W. Tapley, and Annie, wife of Harry R. McLellan, share and share alike, and his non-resident son, George P. Scovill and his son-in-law, Frederick W. Tapley, executors and trustees. The petition sets forth that the executors and trustees for reasons therein stated, are unable to set forth the exact value of the estate, but after examination they will file an inventory. Barnhill, Ewing & Sanford are proctors.

In the matter of the estate of William H. Nese, merchant, the accounts of the executors, Walter H. Fleming, manufacturer, and William A. Ewing, barrister-at-law, were filed with a petition to pass them. A citation was issued returnable on March 20 at 10.30 a. m.

In the matter of the estate of Samuel Corbett, there was return of citation to pass the accounts of Alexander P. Barnhill, sole executor. The accounts being found satisfactory were passed as presented, and an order for distribution made of the balance of said estate. William A. Ewing, K. C. is proctor.

In the estate of Count DeBury, there was an adjourned hearing on return of citation to pass accounts. D. R. Jack, who acted for Ellen Foley in regard to the rentals of a property held by her as security for a claim against the estate, filed his accounts as such agent and they were passed and allowed. An agreement was entered into between the counsel present for the sale of two leaseholds, the proceeds to be held pending decision regarding the application of the same. Mr. Knowles in the meanwhile to have his accounts completed by an auditor up to the date to which further adjournment is made, namely March 27. Mr. Knowles and Mr. Regan, the executors and trustees appeared in person. Mr. Mullin, K. C., Mr. Barnhill, K. C. and Mr. Campbell, are advocates for others interested.

WIRELESS REPORT
FROM CASSANDRA

The Dominion liner Cassandra, Captain John Mitchell, bound from Glasgow for this port, was 108 miles off at 10 o'clock this morning, and is expected to arrive here during this evening. It is not expected that she will dock before tomorrow morning.

The steamer has eighty-five cabin and 100 steerage passengers. She reported by wireless that all were well and that there had been no sickness on board.

Twenty-one of the Cassandra's passengers are for the United States.
