Cultivator Set to Work.

Within two weeks after the transplanting the horse-drawn cultivator is set to work, and then the hoeing by hand begins. The hoeing is repeated three times at least during a season, and each time must be done with greater care not to injure the growing leaves. When the plant reaches the building stage the process of topping begins. The buds are broken off so that the plant will go to leaf instead of seed. Usually 12 to 14 leaves are left on a stalk. The next process is the "suckering." This consists in breaking off the little shoots and leaves that sprout at the point where the main leaf joins the stalk. The "suckers" are destroyed so as to save all available nourishment for the leaves.
