

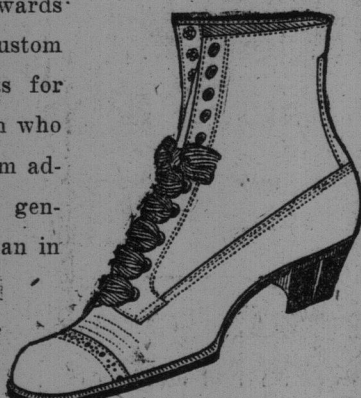

HON. MR. PUGSLEY IS
DECLARED ELECTED BY TWO

Error of 63 Votes Against Him in Official Declaration But Re-count Would Show Them to His Credit

An error of the deputy returning officer for the A. to L. division of Brooks ward was responsible for the majority of High William Pugsley in Thursday's election being cut to two, when he was officially declared elected on Saturday. The deputy's slip showed Mr. Pugsley to have received 170 votes in his division and that this is an impossibility is shown by a comparison of the city and county vote. On the same list, where Dr. Daniel received only 100 votes. Conservatives are talking of a recount. The only change of any consequence possible will be the adding of the 63 votes to Dr. Pugsley's majority. The official returns are:

The county figures are not completed yet as ballot box has not been brought in, that from Dipper Harbor. The count to date and estimated places Dr. Daniel's majority at about 112. The count will be completed tomorrow morning.

DROWNED IN KENNEBECASIS

A sad drowning accident took place yesterday about 4 o'clock p.m. at Drury Cove, when Howard Camp fell into the Kennebecasis from aboard the yacht "Helena," owned by Neil A. Forsythe. The yacht with Mr. Camp, H. Forsythe, Jas. Brayden and Mr. Seely aboard, left Millville yesterday morning and on the way to the Kennebecasis. A few minutes previous to the drowning Mr. Seely had a narrow escape when fastening the tender, as he fell overboard and was rescued in an exhausted condition.

It is thought that a sudden jolting of the craft caused Mr. Camp to lose his balance. Mr. Brayden was at the wheel at the time, and Mr. Camp was at work behind him. On hearing a splash the helmsman looked about and saw his friend struggling in the water. He swam for a few minutes quite strongly, but suddenly went under in about 100 feet of water before any assistance could be rendered. The body was not found last night, but grappling was in progress this morning.

Howard Camp was about 35 years of age and was employed as caremaker at Fleming's foundry. He was the only surviving son of his widowed mother, Mrs. Solomon Camp, 87 Paradise row. He had been a member of the R. N. Y. C. from the earliest years of that organization, and was one of the most popular members. The news of his tragic death was a great shock to his many friends and sincere sympathy will be felt for his aged mother.

SUNDAY Y. M. C. A. MEETINGS

A meeting held at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon in the Y. M. C. A. building in connection with the men and religion movement was attended by a large number of both laymen and clergymen. A. W. Robb led the meeting and at the opening spoke of the origin of the movement, briefly outlining the objects the supporters of it had in view.

A very impressive funeral service was held in the Waterloo street Baptist church on Sunday evening in memory of the late Deacon William Peters. Sydney, N. S. W., Sept. 23—Some

months ago the Antarctic explorer Dr.

Douglas Mawson, who is an eminent geologist, geologist in local mining

circles by the announcement that he had

discovered a valuable deposit of radium

ore at Mount Painter, a far northern

district of the state of South Australia.

Dr. Mawson has, since his return from

England again visited the spot and issues

a long report.

He declares that there is a vast lode of

radium ore at least three miles long and

from a few feet to several hundred yards

wide. The deposit is of high grade and a

quarter of a ton is ready for shipment.

Dr. Mawson calculates the net profit per

ton of ore at \$1,135. He says there are

huge deposits of cerium (aluminum-bearing ore) in the vicinity.

Two Hundred Cars Held up By Floods

Get By Only With Aid of Horses

Paris, Sept. 23—The Geneva newspaper,

speaking from the local sheets of the Can-

ton of Grisons, most an unusual incident

consequent on the recent floods in the Ty-

rol. Nearly 200 motor cars have been

held up on their way back to Germany

by broken down bridges and culverts and

damaged roads and their owners applied

to the authorities of Grisons for leave to

cross its territory, in which all motor traffic

is forbidden.

The council after deliberation consented

to allow the detested vehicles within their

borders, but only on condition that they

should be drawn by horses and that the

inhabitants would not be annoyed by

smoke, smells and tooting of horns. Com-

pelled to submit to these humiliating

terms the motorists are now being drag-

ged in inglorious procession through the

impassable cañon of Grisons.
