The voting on the Scott Act in this county on Friday last resulted in a great victory for its advocates, the Act carrying by the decisive majority of 775. Woodsteck gave 200, Blandford 2, East Oxford 4, and Tilsonburg 49 against the Act. Every other municipality gave a majority for the Act. We give below the official returns received last night, also, for the purpose of comparison, the vote polled on the Dunkin Act in January,

The result of the polling has clearly and decisively demonstrated the temperance sentiment of the people of the County of Oxford. The majority being large, there will be less difficulty in enforcing the law, for there can now be no doubt of the wishes of a majority of the people. It remains for the advocates of the Act to see to it that when the law comes in force next year, it is strictly obeyed and a fair

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
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
