CABINET MEETS.

First Session Since Election Is Held—

Routine Business Handled.

Ottawa, Nov. 5.—The first sitting of the Cabinet Council since the election was held in Sir Wilfrid Laurier's house yesterday afternoon. Only routine business was transacted. The Ministers present included Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, Hon. S. A. Fisher, Sir Richard Cartwright, Sir Fred Borden, Hon. Chas. Murphy, Hon. William Paterson, and Hon. L. P. Brodeur.

Hon. Mr. Fisher leaves to-day for Rome to attend the international congress on agriculture.

R. L. Borden's official majority in Carleton County is 1,370. J. E. Caldwell, his Liberal opponent, loses his deposit.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

The Pope yesterday gave private audience to the Archbishop of Montreal.

Tomas Estrada Palma, the first President of the Cuban Republic, died last night.

John Carter, Guelph Township farmer, who Tuesday had his scalp partially torn off and the vertebrae of the neck dislocated, died yesterday.

The grand jury at Woodstock brought in "no bill" against Emil Rose of Norwich, charged with perjury in connection with the recent election.

Hon. J. E. Agnew, Provincial Treasurer of Manitoba, is believed to have passed the crisis and doctors have some hope, although his condition is still precarious.

A large number of Hungarians employed at the Belleville Cement Works, near that city, have been laid off and left the city. It is said the works will soon close down for the winter.

A recount of the votes balloted in West Middlesex before Judge MacBeth in the town hall, Glencoe, on Saturday, W. S. Calvert's official majority over Robert McLaughlin is 15.

Three Killed.

Guelph, Nov. 5.—Mrs. Robt. Scott and two sons, Leonard and Murray, aged 11 and 13 years, of Hullet, were instantly killed yesterday morning on the Guelph and Goderich Railroad, two crossings east of Auburn and eleven miles from Goderich. They were driving to school and were struck by a light engine, running up from Guelph Junction. The bodies escaped, but the buggy was struck, and all three occupants killed.

A heavy snowstorm contributed to the occurrence.

Natural Gas Explodes.

Chatham, Nov. 5.—The residence of Michael Egan, Raleigh street, was almost totally wrecked by an explosion of natural gas in the cellar yesterday afternoon.

The windows were shattered and the plaster shaken off the walls in nearly every room.

The gas was ignited by workmen looking for a leak. Foreman S. T. Copas of the Chatham Gas Co., was badly burned.

THOSE WHO GOT PENSIONS

NEARLY HALF A MILLION HAVE ALREADY APPLIED IN BRITAIN.

London, Nov. 4.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer has informed Mr. Timothy Davies, M. P., that the total number of claims received by the old-age pension officers up to the 10th inst. amounted to 468,164.

Of this number there came from England 273,862, Ireland 151,610, Scotland 49,077, Wales 13,615.

It is believed that the total will reach 500,000 before the lists finally close.

MEN'S CLUB ORGANIZED

ROOMS WILL BE OPENED FOR WINTER SEASON NOV. 10.

SIGNS OF PROSPERITY

SIR THOMAS SHAUGHNESSY RETURNS FROM THE WEST.

Montreal, Nov. 4.—President Sir Thomas Shaughnessy of the Canadian Pacific Railway returned to Montreal this morning. The President has been making a thorough inspection of the whole of the company's lines in the west, and just before his return to this city he inspected the Toronto terminals, where alterations in the yards at West Toronto are expected.

In an interview the President expressed satisfaction at the evidences of the return of prosperity displayed throughout the west. "The general prosperity of the country was one of the most pleasing features of our trip," he said. "Everywhere there are evident signs of better times, and all departments of commercial and industrial life show good improvement."

In connection with his visit to Vancouver and Victoria the President said: "We have many improvements under way on Vancouver Island, and advance will be made with these as rapidly as is reasonable. Every effort will be made to aid the people in the development of the great resources of the Island."

As to the company's plans for next year in regard to the railway itself, Sir Thomas said the work of extension would go on in accordance with the plans that had been formulated, but as to a specific program for next year nothing had been decided. The completion of the line from Saskatoon to Edmonton is now within sight. Sir Thomas had nothing to say regarding the new boats on the Atlantic.

RELIEVING UNEMPLOYED

VARIOUS SCHEMES TO AID THE HUNGRY IN BRITAIN.

London, Nov. 4.—Put briefly, the British Government proposals for relief of the unemployed are as follows: War Office open to take 24,000 recruits in special reserve. This would cost \$1,000,000.

Admiralty to employ 2,100 additional men for repairing warships.

Tenders for five new cruisers to be issued earlier than the routine time.

Central grant for unemployed increased to \$1,500,000, and restrictions respecting men who have received poor-law relief removed.

Postoffice to take 8,000 men during Christmas season, at wages ranging from \$4 to \$5 per week.

The various municipalities in Britain have decided on remunerative works of all kinds which had previously been decided on, and these amounts in the aggregate exceed \$10,000,000.
