

# TELEGRAPH NEWS.

**LONDON, Nov. 27.**  
The following candidates for Parliament have been elected without opposition:  
The Marquis of Lorne, Liberal; and the Right Hon. Henry T. L. Cory, Lord E. de la Roche, returned from Haddingtonshire; Mr. George Thell, Liberal, from Lanarkshire; and Major Hamilton, Liberal, from Lanarkshire.

Riots broke out at Tredgarn during the election, and much damage was done to property. The authorities were obliged to call upon the troops to suppress the disturbances. The rioters have been arrested and order is restored. No lives are reported to have been lost.

Riots have occurred at Loughton and Bampton in the County of Gloucestershire. The military were called out to suppress the disturbances and quiet was restored.

Several persons have been arrested in Paris by the police for making speeches at public meetings.

Requiem masses were celebrated in Cork and at Queenstown for the repose of the souls of the Fenians who executed at Manchester. In both cases a great demonstration was made, the people attending the ceremonies in large numbers. There was no interference on the part of the authorities and good order was maintained.

**Montreal, Nov. 26.**  
The Courts of review were occupied to-day with the case of Grange against "L'Espresso" and for damages in the sum of \$10,000 for breach of promise. A demurrer had been raised in the Court below on the plea that "L'Espresso" Canada had not recognized a breach of promise to marry actionable. The demurrer was dismissed and the judgment confirmed.

**New York, Nov. 27.**  
Gold 135 1/2.  
At twelve o'clock last night 1633 members of the House of Commons had been elected. Liberals elected 575, Conservatives 258. Liberal majority 117.

**Havana, Nov. 27.**  
Merchants here are raising subscriptions for the pay and equipment of three months volunteers, so they may enter immediately on active service against the rebels.

Rumors are rife that several cargoes of arms for the revolution have been landed, but the government has received no official information of the facts.

It is reported that a secret commission has left Cuba for New York, with the object of collecting the favor of the American Press and Government for the rebellion in this island.

**New York, 28.**  
No cable dispatches have been received from London of later date than Friday noon. A storm eastwards is said to cause the delay.

**Gold 135.**  
Great preparations are being made at Birmingham for the reception of Reverend John Bright on Wednesday next. John Bright and others will speak on the occasion.

The dinner to Mr. Johnson, which was contemplated by the Workingmen's Society of this city, has been abandoned.

The Right Hon. Lord Disraeli has declined George. His wife has been created Viscountess of Beaconsfield.

**New York, 28.**  
Gun. Grant will visit Boston early next week to arrange for placing one of his sons in Harvard College.

Money in fair demand at 6 1/2 per cent. Gold weak at 134 1/2.

**London, Nov. 29.**  
The Press of this City unite in commending Mr. Disraeli's refusal of the Peerage and his testimony next. The journals also eulogize the career of the Premier.

The Conservatives have carried the South-west division of the west, riding off Surrey, and also the western division of Surrey, reducing the Liberal majority by five, election of four members.

In the manufacturing district the bitter spirit of the Orangemen was enlisted against the candidates who favor the disestablishment of the Irish Church.

**LONDON, Nov. 27.**  
The London stock brokers have a social triumph to boast of. The eldest son of the Duke of Richmond, one of the peers who sit on the highest pedestal of rank, fell in love with the pretty daughter of a professional stock broker, one of the shrewd gentlemen who attend on the London Exchange and buy and sell shares for a commission. The Duke's parents remonstrated and threatened, but the conquest was complete, and a fortnight ago the marriage was celebrated. Readers of the journals noted with surprise that only the lady's friends were present at the ceremony. Not one of the ducal circle witnessed the marriage of the heir—an event which is usually celebrated with lavish festivities. Perceives with daughters were terrified. Gracious Heavens! the future Duchess of Richmond a stock broker's daughter! and a stock broker whose ancestors not far back were Portuguese Jews! The thing is horrible. But on the stock Exchange there was rejoicing. Brokers with large families encourage a new kind of speculation, and the British aristocracy is dearer to them than ever. The Duke of Richmond is one of Mr. Disraeli's supporters. It happens that another member of the Tory government, also the eldest son of a Duke, married out of the ranks. Lord Robert Montagu cast prejudices to the winds, and some years ago took for his wife a pretty and well behaved house maid, now on her way to the Duchess of Manchester. Thus does the aristocracy absorb into itself "new blood."

**A TEMPERANCE WAVE.**—The "Morning News" states that on last Wednesday afternoon, a united meeting of the Executive of the Grand Division Sons of Temperance, was held in the office of the Grand Scribe at St. John. Chas. F. Clinch, Esq., W. G. V., was requested to act as Chairman, and Wm. W. Dudley, G. Scribe, as Secretary. And adds that perfect unanimity of feeling prevailed as to the necessity of putting forth energetic efforts at this time in behalf of the cause of Total Abstinence.

After a lengthy and harmonious discussion, the following resolutions were adopted, viz.:—  
"Resolved, That the Chairman and Secretary be authorized to open a correspondence with Messrs. Gough, Moffat and Caswell with a view of inducing one or other of these gentlemen to visit this Province and deliver a course of lectures on the subject of Temperance."

"Resolved, That this Committee recommend to the Orders that they represent the advantage to be derived from holding fraternal meetings, and of evening meetings for the public advocacy of our cause."

"Resolved, That in view of the great necessity now existing for special public Temperance effort in this Province, and having in grateful remembrance the great success which in the past attended the advocacy of the cause by prominent speakers in our midst, this Executive earnestly request that to all future invitations from Divisional or Lodge Committees, a favorable reply may be given."

"Resolved, That the members of this Executive Committee representing the Orders of Templars and Sons of Temperance, cannot separate without expressing their unwavering faith in the ultimate triumph of our principles, and for its immediate consummation earnestly invite the co-aid and untiring labors of the entire brotherhood and of all friends of Temperance throughout the Province."

The Ottawa correspondent of the Toronto Globe writing on the 26th, says that it is rumored that the Civil Service Commission has reported in favor of abolishing three Cabinet offices, but that two French members on the Commission refused to sign it. A recommendation was also made that fifty persons be dismissed from among those officers who have not been five years in the public service. Will this include any of the few appointed from the Lower Provinces? A scheme of superannuation is also recommended.

The thirty-fifth anniversary of the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. John B. Gough was celebrated, on Tuesday evening, at his residence at "Hillside," Worcester. The attendance was very large, many distinguished guests from abroad being present. The display of gifts, mostly silver, was magnificent. Gifts were sent from northern and western cities, and the whole were valued at \$3000.

The Charleston papers are full stating themselves upon the establishment of a steam line to Europe, the first steamer, the Golden Horn, having just cleared for Liverpool with a cargo of two thousand five hundred and fifty three bales of apparel and one hundred and eighty-eight bales of sea island cotton.

An interesting private letter from Rear Admiral Dyer has been received in Washington. He says that Lopez has been miserably treated by the recent stories of outrages upon foreigners and others.

The Maine Educational Association, which has been in session for a few days past at Augusta, adjourned on Wednesday.

The Fenian Congress at Philadelphia has published some resolutions addressed to all "national Irishmen."

The San Francisco Bulletin says, the cash amount of damages in those portions of the city most affected by the recent earthquake does not exceed \$271,000 in round numbers, while the most liberal estimate that can reasonably be made for miscellaneous minor damages, not specially reported, will not make the grand total for the whole city and county exceed \$350,000 or \$400,000.

# The Standard.

SANCT ANDREWS, DEC. 2, 1868.

The recent Money panic in St. John is subsiding. St. Stephen Bank has made arrangements with three of the City Banks for a loan to meet the present emergency, mainly brought about by a most untoward affair, the "Scovil swindle" as is termed by the city journals. Mr. Scovil was reported to be a wealthy and honorable man, a private Banker and Broker, and was agent for the St. Stephen Bank, and when he closed his doors against those seeking gold for the notes, having previously redeemed a few thousands of them with specie and other bank notes—no one supposed that his affairs were in such confusion, that the numerous depositors in his private bank would lose their money; but he has engendered them and been the means of reducing many to poverty, and that he has failed! He also sold the lease of the building occupied as his place of business, assigned his real estate and household effects to his relatives, allowed the St. Stephen Bank to secure itself, made no assignment for the benefit of his creditors—nowwithstanding the deposits in his hands were nearly a quarter of a million. His friend Major Robinson stood by him to the last, when arrested got bail for him, but the amounts at last were so large, that the "Major" failed in obtaining bail, and ended his escape from the Sheriff's custody. Mr. Scovil was arrested in a barn at Kingston, and is safely lodged in Kings Co. jail.

Major Robinson was arrested, placed in jail, afterwards examined before the Police Magistrate and again committed, pending his decision. A Judge's order was obtained, and Major Robinson is out on bail, himself in \$500 and Beverly Robinson and Dr. Wetmore in \$250 each. It is reported that Sheriff Harding has applied to one of the Judge's for a writ of Habeas Corpus, for the purpose of having Mr. Scovil returned to his custody, he being an escaped prisoner. The foregoing resume is taken from our city exchanges.

The Globe quotes Commercial Bank paper at 82 cents, and St. Stephen Bank 94 to 97 according to demand. It is also stated by the same paper, of Monday evening:—  
It is said that the Bank of Montreal and Bank of New Brunswick on Saturday afternoon and this morning each redeemed \$20,000 St. Stephen's paper and then stopped taking it.

The Telegraph says:—This is not correct. Mr. Bolton (not the Banks), is redeeming and will continue to redeem while he remains here, in the manner mentioned above. The Bank will redeem at its own counter on Thursday or Friday of this week.

The Rev. W. Wilson of Chatham, has been presented with an Address by a Deputation from his late Congregation at Campbellton, Restigouche. Accompanying the address was an elegant Silver Tea and Coffee service, consisting of five pieces of elegant workmanship. The silver bears the following inscription:—  
"Presented to the Wm. Wilson, M. A., by his friends in Restigouche, as tokens of their esteem for him as a Faithful Minister of the Gospel."

The Rev. gentleman made a suitable reply. Our Presbyterian friends at the North, can appreciate the labors of their faithful, zealous, and talented Minister, although removed to another sphere of labor in a distant County.

The Lecture season at the St. John Mechanics Institute, was opened with great eclat on Monday evening last, by the Lieutenant Governor—to whom an Address was read by the President, and responded to by His Honor. The Lieut. Governor then delivered a largely and admirable oration on Education, advocating free schools, and pointed out that New Brunswick was behind other parts of the Dominion in respect to education, and that the education buildings generally were a disgrace to the Province. During the address he was frequently applauded.

The New York Advertiser has been sold by Messrs. Morrell & Shepherd to Mr. Kimball Cornwallis, who promises to introduce some new features in its management such as financial and commercial affairs, Railway, Mining, Telegraphic, Steamship and other enterprises. We trust that the new proprietor may reap a rich harvest, and the old "Albion" may continue as heretofore, the exponent of British sentiment and opinion in the United States.
