The accused, B-83098., Sapper Fell, J. F., No. 1 Canadian Tunnelling Coy., R.C.E., C.A.S.F. being duly sworn is examined by the Defending Officer.

- Q. 1. "Will you tell the Court what you were doing on the 6th. December, 1940? Just tell it in your own words."
- A. 1. "That afternoon I was on parade and then went up to my room to get cleaned up to go on guard at 4.45 p.m. I had shaved and was all prepared to go on guard and was cleaning my tools and as I always use kerosene to clean them, I went and took some out of the M.T.Section. I went up and the Store house was locked and no one knew anything about it, so I went in to get some kerosene which I got and then I went back. I had no intentions of stealing petrol and I did not have any petrol in my hands."
 - Q. 2. "You went up and couldn't get in the door and the window was broken out?"
 - A. 2. "Yes."
 - Q. 3. "You were looking for the kerosene when Sapper Mulholland arrived at the window?"
 - A. 3. "I was moving the tins out of the way."
 - Q. 4. "The evidence stated that this window was intact.
 At any time previous had you noticed that the window was cracked?"
 - A. 4. "Yes, about 2 months ago."
 - Q. 5. "At any previous time had you been sent up for kerosene?"
 - A. 5. "Yes."
 - Q. 6. "At this time you wanted kerosene to clean your barbers tools and clippers with?"
 - A. 6. "Yes, Sir."

The Prosecuting Officer then cross-examines the Witness.

- Q. 1. "Have you ever been told that it was your right to enter the petrol stores?"
- A. 1. "No, but I have been sent up there on previous occasions."
- Q. 2. "You were aware that there was a person in charge of the petrol stores?"
- A. 2. "No."
- Q. 3. "You were accustomed to going into the stores?"
- A. 3. "Yes."
- Q. 4. "You were accustomed to going in tarough the window?"
- A. 4. "No."
