## Latest Revenue Returns Show Big Increase

The Customs revenue from July 1st to August 23rd this year amounts to \$842,690.54. For the corresponding period last year the amount was \$751,030.94. The gratifying increase of nearly \$92,000 is a practical illustration of the improvement in general trade, and also of the business-like methods which have been introduced into the Customs Department since the Monroe Administration took charge. We understand that the increase is in addition to several substantial outstanding accounts recently collected.—Telegram.

## C. L. B. Notes.

A small attendance again this week. Only seventy-four on duty. Many of our lovers of athletics were over to see the five mile race at St. Bon's Campus. The Lieut. Col. was on duty, with Major Herbert Outerbridge, M.B.E., Brigade Major Williams, Capt. A. S. Lewis, P. B. Rendell, and Harold Hayward and Lieuts. Eric Jerret, Orderly Officer and W. R. Motty. Several officers on leave duty in the Armoury last night had the honour of meeting Captain A. E. Nash formerly Captain of A. Company and who commanded that unit in the celebrated battle of Waterford Brigade. All ranks were glad to see one of the pioneer officers of Brigade work in Newfoundland visit the Headquarters of his old regiment. Capt. Nash did yeoman work for the Brigade, particularly in the days of the "King's Road Armoury," now Parsons' garage. Joining the Brigade then he was a tower of strength bringing to the Brigade his military training and experience gained in the Governor General's Foot Guards of Ottawa. Captain Nash is looking young and Father Time has gently dealt with him all the years. He left here in 1901 and has been living the past ten years in Halifax and is associated with the Bank of Montreal and is now visiting Newfoundland on inspection duties. He expressed himself as more than pleased with the present quarters of the Brigade and said his old Regiment had made splendid progress since the days he held commission when Sir Joseph Outerbridge was Officer Commanding and Surgeon Major Herbert Rendell, the late Doctor Fred Stubb, and non-commissioned officers Cartwright and Major Powys-Keck, Lt.-Col. W. H. Franklin, Captain N. Snow, and others were doing duty. The present Brigade Major Williams was then Lieut. and Paymaster. We were glad to hear from Old Comrade William J. Groves, jr., of St. John, N. B. this week enclosing photographs of H. M. S. Calcutta and H. M. S. Constance at the pier there. He hopes to influence the organization of a C. L. B. Company through the assistance of the Rector of Trinity Church. He sends hearty greetings to the lads, and is doing his best to maintain the old motto, "Fight the Good Fight." Captain Lewis, Cashier of the Savings Bank Department reports on 31st July with 169 accounts and \$322.30 on deposit. Four percent interest is paid and every lad is asked to open a Savings Bank account with the C. L. B. Bank and practice thrift.

We thank the energetic organizing officer, of our C.L.B. South African Regiment for a copy of the proceedings of the C. L. B. Conference in the Church House, Burg Street, Cape town, July 5th, which is an enterprising document. We hope to follow this good example some day and have a Newfoundland C. L. B. Conference of officers at some convenient place. Our South African comrades are doing splendid work. In 1900 they did their share in the Boer War. In 1914 His Excellency Lord Burton, Governor General of the Union of South Africa very deservedly said "That the C.L.B. was known as the cradle of the famous Cape Corps." South Africa has now a membership of 2700 lads with 31 Cadet Companies, 19 Training Corp Companies with a membership of 700 all ranks. The Rev. P. C. Ryan is Organizing Officer and makes it his special aim—the furtherance of C.L.B. interests in South Africa. The following subjects were discussed at the Conference: The constitution, Dress Regulations, Annual Reviews and Sports. A review will be held regularly on the King's Birthday and Annual Sports on December 26th, (Boxing Day).

Major Herbert Outerbridge, M. B. E., who recently paid a visit to London Headquarters, reports having the pleasure of an interview with the Brigade Secretary, Rev. Edgar Rogers, M.A., who was delighted to meet an officer from Newfoundland and to hear of the doings of the C. L. B. their first Overseas Company.

## Toll of Wednesday's Storm

Canso, N. S., Aug. 28th.—F. De Witt Wells and his son, Way, and C. Chapman, of New York, and two members of the crew of Mr. Wells' 40 foot auxiliary yacht Shanghai had a narrow escape from drowning on Wednesday night when the yacht was smashed to atoms on the rocks at White Head near Canso.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 28.—Capt. V. A. Miller, of Stanley Bridge, P.E.I., and his crew of five men are believed to have perished when the 191-ton schooner Anna MacDonald, owned by Hon. J. A. MacDonald, Charlottetown, was smashed on the rocks at Kitty Witly, about 20 miles west of here, during the terrific storm which swept the coast last night. No bodies have been found.

Washington, Aug. 27.—A radio message received to-day by the Air Signal Corps from Winnipeg, Manitoba, requested assistance of Government stations for the steamer Lady Kinderley, which was declared to be in danger of sinking with 15 persons on board.

Yarmouth, N.S., Aug. 28.—Joseph Watkins, of Yarmouth, was drowned last night and his brother and companion, named O'Connell, had a narrow escape from death when their shing smack Lizzie E. was wrecked during a storm at Yarmouth Bar. Watkins is survived by wife and two children.
