BUTTE, Mont., June 15.—A unique roundup will start today on the Flat Head Indian Reservation in Western Montana when the Pablo Lord of buffaloes will be corralled and driven to the big stockade in Ravalli. There the animals will be loaded on specially constructed cars. A number of the finest specimens will go to the Canadian National Park. Others of the animals will be shipped to eastern parks.

GOLDEN RULE APPLIED TO WORK OF THE POLICE DEPT.

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 15.—Major Richard Sylvester, chief of police of Washington and president of the International Association of Chiefs of Police, in opening today's convention of that organization declared that it was a source of gratification to observe that the tendency in policing throughout the country is decidedly in the direction of general uniformity and it must follow that the efforts of this association will within the next few years redound in the evolving of one general system, this however, on the hypothesis that those engaged in the conduct of state and municipal affairs will encourage our efforts in that direction.

EMPERORS OF RUSSIA AND GERMANY MEET TOMORROW

Matters of Great International Importance to be Discussed—The Present Situation Not Likely to be Changed.

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 15.—"Health and Sanitation" was the first subject discussed at today's conference of the National Conference of Charities and Correction. In the absence of Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, of the Department of Agriculture, Washington, Dr. Wilson, of Philadelphia, read a paper prepared by Dr. Wiley on "The Food Supplies of Charitable and Semi-Charitable Institutions."

ST. NEW ORLEANS, La., June 15.—The Times editorial today says: Events are marching on towards revolution in Honduras, according to despatches received yesterday by the local business houses engaged in Central American trade. The country faces a most dangerous crisis probably the most serious since the fall of General Bonilla in 1906.
