GARTMELL BEAT POSTLE AT 220 YARDS DISTANCE

Ex-amateur Gives Professionals a "Jar"— News of Sport in the Old Country— Some Good Marathon Runners

LONDON, Jan. 20.—The old professionals who are so apt to sneer at amateurs, and ridicule the possibility of any of them running 100 yards in 10 seconds, got a nasty "jar" when N.B. Cartmell beat A. B. Postle for the 220 yards professional championship. Another ex-amateur has now scored, viz. J. Frison, of Small Heath, who ran his first race as a professional at Edinburgh on Monday. This was the Powderhall 2100 Marathon race of 26 miles and 300 yards. A year ago the event was decided on the road and won by St. Yves, but this time it was contested on the famous track of Powderhall. An upward of 20,000 people watched the race, there appears to be a big future for long distance running up north. There was a very strong wind up, consequently the 23 competitors had a hard track and the times of the leaders are even more meritorious than they appear at first glance. Although G. W. Gardiner's feet were still in a bad condition in consequence of his race with Dorando on the small Albert Hall track, he decided to start, and put up a very fine effort for over half the journey. He and F. Clark, of Scotland, showed the way for 12 miles when the Englishman was dropped and finally compelled to give up at 13 miles. The ultimate winner (Frison) showed splendid judgment and jogged along about half to three-quarters of the big lap behind the leaders for seven miles. After this stage he gradually drew up, and when he ran up to Clark's shoulder just after completing 20 miles, good judges felt confident that the ex-amateur would take premier honors. He wisely stayed in the lead behind the Scotchman and so got some shelter from the strong wind. How beneficial this proved, was shown by the manner Frison came away from his chief rival when he made his final effort, and gained 100 yards in the last quarter. Moreover, Frison was not up, in spite of the record breaking pace of the race. Clark proved himself a game and good runner and had the excellent judgment to let the winner, the issue would have been Clarke at 20 miles, and at his best he ought to be quite equal to it. Frison, so England, at last appears to have some real good Marathon runners.

SHAWBRIDGE, Jan. 20.—"During the twelve months ensuing we shall discharge on expiry of sentence ten boys, of whom four have no homes and the remainder probably homes of doubtful character.
