SHOT HIS GRANDMOTHER

While Snapping a Revolver Boy Sends Bullet Into an 80 Year Old Woman

NEW YORK, Oct. 9 .- Mrs. Pauline Oukner, 80 years old, was shot and probably mortally wounded by her grandson, Harry Oukner, 21 years old, in their home at Hinsdale streets and New Lots avenue, East New York, last evening. The shooting is supposed to have been accidental.

Oukner was cleaning an old revolver of the Interior, it was a living, tangible with which he hoped to shoot horse thieves, said to have been seen lurking around his father's barns. Mrs. Pauline Oukner and Harry's father and mother were seated in the room. After oiling the revolver the young man began snapping the hammer under the impression that there were no cartridges in the chambers. Unfortunately, he was a member of parliament, and as such a trustee of the public interest, and bound to keep himself clear of undue obligation to railway companies which are constantly coming before parliament for subsidies or privileges.

Mr. Lefurgey thinks he got no favor. A letter from Mr. Towler to Mr. Lefurgey stafed that the C, P. R. was showing favor—giving to the syndicate "the best that was going."
