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Standard's Correspondent Reviews Debate at Ottawa

Session Promises to be Exceedingly Lively One -- Opposition Speakers Make but Poor Showing in Criticism of Borden Government -- Mr. Pugsley's Optimism Gone Since Defeat of Reciprocity -- Hon. Mr. Hazen Creates Excellent Impression.

Ottawa, Thursday, Nov. 22.—What ever truth there might be in the prediction that the present session will be short there can be no question of the opposition, who are still smarting from defeat, that it is to be no love feast. The government, on the other hand, led by an unusual array of aggressive and effective speakers, have thus early in the day clearly demonstrated that they are not to be taken for granted.

The policy of the government as outlined in the speech from the throne offered but a poor basis for criticism, and in consequence the sole aim and object of the opposition, so far have been a futile but not the less barefaced attempt to discredit the French speaking members of the cabinet and by innuendo and false suggestion to raise the racial question as the only means in sight to embarrass the government. Sir Wilfrid Laurier gave the cue at the first sitting of the House last week by his ill-natured and pointless attack on Dr. Sproule when, perfunctorily seconding his election for Speaker, and he followed along the same line on Monday, when opening the debate on the address in reply. Taking the absence of any declaration of policy by the government on the question of naval defence as an excuse he moved an extraordinary amendment, alleging that a "flagrant conflict of opinion" existed among the advisors of the Crown, and that the inclusion by the Prime Minister in the present cabinet of members holding diametrically opposite views should not receive the support of the House. Around this amendment the conflict has wages and wandered far afield to the discussion of reciprocity and other issues.

One very interesting fact has been demonstrated, that the Liberal party is a household divided against itself as to whether reciprocity is a dead end, or a live issue. Mr. Guthrie, of Wellington, for instance, in the course of his speech declared emphatically: "This reciprocity proposal is dead." Mr. Carvell, in holding the opposite view, pronounced in holding the opposite view, "I am here to state," he said, "that reciprocity and subjects closely

related to it are not dead, as far as the Maritime Provinces are concerned." Other opposition speakers hold widely divergent opinions. The opportunity on the government side was too good to be missed and it remained for Mr. Bennett (East Simcoe) to point out before suggesting that there was a difference of opinion on the naval question it would be well first for honorable gentlemen opposite to look at their own household and particularly at the question of reciprocity. But whether the pact is dead beyond question or not as part of the Liberal policy, it has been eagerly seized upon as a subject for debate, and several speakers revived at great length and with some original arguments, apparently forgetful of the fact that there had been a general election.

The Naval Defence.

With regard to naval defence, Mr. Borden in replying to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, stated clearly and concisely where the government stands. After referring to the fact that the naval proposals of the late government involved an expenditure of nearly \$50,000,000 in the next ten years, he continued:

"It was argued in parliament, and there was never any satisfactory or reasonable answer to our contention, that as a fighting force, it would be absolutely useless when completed. Further than that it would be a principle of a dismantled navy, and I think it can be demonstrated to the satisfaction of the right hon. gentleman himself, and will be demonstrated before the end of the session, that before such a navy would be completed it would be absolutely obsolete. Do not you consider that under those circumstances an expenditure of that kind would be carried on? I say there is only one thing to be done, and that is to stop such a system of wasteful expenditure—and we propose to do it. Further, Mr. Speaker, in your instance, the proposal is to be done, and we shall reconsider it, and in so grave and important a departure, affecting for all time to come the relations of this Dominion to the rest of the Empire, it is infinitely better to be right than to be in a hurry. The question of permanent co-operation between this Dominion and the rest of the Empire ought to be threshed out and debated before the people, and not to be postponed until the day of November last. My right hon. friend has spoken of the resolutions that were passed, and has called attention to which I myself moved declaring:

"That no such proposals can safely be accepted until they have been thoroughly considered and approved by the House, and that no effective co-operation in any common scheme of Empire defence.

"That the said proposals will necessitate heavy outlay for construction and maintenance and will give no immediate or effective aid to the Empire and no adequate or satisfactory results to Canada.

"That no permanent policy should be entered upon, involving large future expenditures of this character, until it has been submitted to the people and has received their approval."

The Opposition Desperate.

There was no equivocation about that statement and Mr. Borden allowed that in his concluding remarks in opposing the desperate straits of the opposition, "I am very glad," he added, "that the right hon. gentleman, who has the courage of the sticking point of proposing this motion. It is conceived in the first of this spirit as the right hon. gentleman's motion, and I shall invite the House to take it in the same summary manner as that should be given an opportunity to the right hon. gentleman with respect to the reciprocal trade arrangement proposed in this parliament session. I do not desire to dismiss it from notice as inspired not by any desire to conserve or advance the public interest of this country, but by a motion put forward with a view to excite supposed dissensions, which do not exist and in that way to conduce to the advantage of the political fortunes of my right hon. friend, which unfortunately for him and his party, have been reduced to a very low ebb, indeed, by the event which took place on the 21st of September last."

The premier was equally clear and ample in dealing with the supposed "flagrant conflict of opinion" in the cabinet. "It is perfectly true," he said "that my hon. friend, the minister of public works (Mr. Monk), two sessions ago, did not see eye to eye with me on the question of merchant conditions, but the point that divided us at that time was not a question of policy, but a question of fact because the minister of public works, had said over and over again that when an emergency confronted this empire, he and those who think with him, would be prepared to do their duty. The minister of public works and I stood together on this common platform that it would be the height of unwisdom and not in the interests of a united and permanent co-operation should be forced on the people of this country without affording them an opportunity to pronounce upon it."

Throughout the debate there has been no effective reply to the strong motion taken by the government. Mr. Guthrie made a savage attack on Mr. White, the minister of finance, and tried to divide the trusts, the mergers, and the corporations, a remark he was compelled to withdraw as unparliamentary. It was he who subsequently somewhat disconcerted his venerable chief by announcing that "Reciprocity is dead." Mr. Carvell, who moved the adjournment of the debate

on Monday, because, as he frankly admitted, he "was not in a position to go on" dealt almost exclusively with reciprocity, and enlarged on the woeful conditions in New Brunswick consequent on the defeat of the pact. E. M. MacDonald, of Pictou, who never had any love for reciprocity, devoted much of his time to quoting speeches by Mr. Monk and criticized statements by Mr. Bourassa in the House in 1906, only to be interrupted by Mr. Monk who told him that he did not know what he was talking about.

Mr. Pugsley drew a gloomy picture of the backward conditions in the Maritime Provinces, all owing, he declared, to the absence of a reciprocity agreement with the United States. Mr. Pugsley waxed particularly eloquent over the fact that he had noticed that Mr. Bourassa had already published in Le Devoir, the questions which were to be submitted to the electorate in the plebiscite on the naval question. One of them he considered an insult to loyal Canadian people, namely that which asked whether the Canadian navy should be available to the Empire in time of war. As the naval bill fathered by his own government expressly stipulated that the Canadian navy should only be available in an Empire war by order-in-council, Mr. Pugsley's remarks were not very opportune.

On the government side the speeches have been of more general interest, dealing with the five issues referred to in the speech from the throne, and with the future development of Canada now freed from the burgher of reciprocity. R. B. Bennett, of Calgary, who had the honor of moving the address in reply, is a former New Brunswick and well maintained the reputation of the province as the birthplace of many public men who have made their mark in Western Canada and elsewhere. Mr. Bennett spoke with a voice that carried well; he spoke with assurance, and his subject was well prepared. There was bitterness in his speech, and he had the good taste as a young member to criticize policies and contested facts rather than opposing personalities. Mr. Severyn, of Dorchester, seconded the address, speaking in French. He made a strong point of the fact that the government's naval proposals were not due to any lack of loyalty, but to an appreciation of the demands of the Liberal scheme. Both mover and seconder justified their reputations as eloquent debaters. Mr. Borden's effective reply to Mr. Severyn has already been referred to.

Mr. Foster kept up as ever. Mr. Foster made a characteristic speech, neat with well maintained and conduced with the opposition upon Continued on page four.
