BAN JOHNSON TELLS OF SULLIVAN'S LONGEST BOUT

President of American League
Reported Bare Knuckle
Fight with Jake Kilrain in
1889.

(By Ban B. Johnson, President of the
American League.)
Chicago, Feb. 6.—When John L. Sul-
livan was matched to fight Jake Kil-
rain for the championship I was sport-
ing editor of the Cincinnati Commer-
cial Tribune, and it was my good for-
tune to be sent by my paper to cover
the fight, which was one of the great-
est ring battles of history, and the last
championship fight with bare knuckles.
It finally took place in New Orleans, and
some time in Sullivan's training camp.
There was great difficulty in finding a
place to hold the contest, as bare
knuckle fights were against the laws.

The heat was terrific. All night long
we had sweated on the train, and it
must have been more than 100 degrees
in the shade when the fight began.
The ring was pitched right on the turf.
It was soon after 8 o'clock in the
morning when the fight began, and I
judge there were about 1800 persons
all told who occupied the seats and
standing room.

Regarding the fight itself, I can say
that it was a terrible struggle. The
rules then were different. Instead of
three-minute rounds, a round ended
when one or the other was knock-
ed down, and he was not permitted to
rise until he had been counted out.
The battle went seventy-five rounds
before Kilrain was knocked out.
Sullivan was the aggressor through-
out and probably would have won ear-
ly in the battle except for the shifting
of Kilrain. On several occasions
the latter allowed himself to slip
to the ground so as to bring the round
to an end and allow him some time to
rest. John L. fought ferociously,
but time after time, when it seemed
he was about to knock Jake out, the
latter would get up and fight.

Some time after forty rounds had
been fought Sullivan became sick at
his stomach and for a time his friends
feared he would be beaten. But Kil-
rain evidently was too exhausted to
take advantage of his opponent's dis-
tress.

I read he even suggested that they
quit and call it draw. The crowd,
John L. of his sickness, for he timed
futilely waded into Jake and landed a
powerful right that knocked Jake flat
on his back.
A hit later John L. landed another
blow squarely and again knocked Jake
to the ground. This time John L.
stepped on his man while he was down
and Kilrain claimed a foul but it was
not allowed.

From then on Kilrain grew weaker
and weaker. Blood was flowing from
his nose and mouth, and it required
only a slight push to send him to the
ground. Finally, in the seventy-fifth
round, he was sent down and could
scarcely get up and his seconds threw
up the sponge.

I remember an incident of the fight
was the falling of a portion of the
seats, but, as I recall it, no one was
seriously hurt.
Fight fans from distant places at-
tended that battle just as they go great
distances today for a championship
fight. I know of no other special
train from New York and another from
Chicago.

**Synopsis of Canadian North-
west Land Regulations.**
The sole head of a family, or any male over 18
years old, who was at the commencement of the
present war, and has continued to be a British
subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country,
Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for Dis-
trict, Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at
certain times and cultivate 50 acres extra. May clear
pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on
certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent if he
cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchase
homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per
acre. Must reside six months in each of three
years. Must cultivate 50 acres extra and erect a house worth
\$100.00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment
as farm laborers in Canada during 1917, as resi-
dence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted
for entry, returned soldiers who have served over
one year and have been honorably discharged, receive
entry day priority in applying for entry. Discharge
Agent's Office (under Sub-Agency). Discharge
papers must be presented to Agent.
