PRESBYTERIAN CHURCHES HELD ANNUAL MEETINGS YESTERDAY

Congregations Assembled in All the Local Presbyterian Churches Last Evening—Reports from Different Branches Received—Officers Elected for Ensuing Term.

The Presbyterian churches in St. John held their annual meetings yesterday, electing their trustees for the year. These meetings are congregational ones, reports of the work being accomplished by the various societies being heard and the finances of the church brought before the members. It is stated that the past year has been a good one, and the financial statements show generous contributions to all funds.

St. David's Church.
St. David's Presbyterian church held their annual meeting in the schoolhouse last evening, with the Moderator, Rev. J. A. MacKeigan, in the chair. The meeting opened with a short devotional service, after which the session presented their report, calling upon the congregation for renewed effort during the coming year. The report showed 44 families added and 26 removed, making the present registry 326. The same number of communicants were added to the roll and 26 removed, making the roll 645.

At Mr. MacKeigan's request, another chairman, F. F. Burpee, was appointed. The report submitted by the Finance Committee advised a bond issue of small denominations to absorb the present loans (at 5 1/2 per cent), and it is confidently hoped that sufficient bonds will be taken up by the congregation to allow the completion of the Sunday School. The minister's stipend was increased to \$2,000 per annum. A loan from the Presbytery for \$4,000 was approved \$910 is on hand in the building fund; \$6,500 was allotted by the General Assembly Committee as their share of the Forward Movement fund of the church.

It was decided to erect a memorial tablet to those of the congregation who had been in the Great War; also that the Sunday School assembly room shall be termed the "Memorial Hall" as a lasting memorial to those who gave their lives for their country.

The Building and Finance Committee, and especially its chairman, John Willet, were given a hearty vote of thanks for their good work.

The completion of the Sunday School was handed over to the present Building Committee to look after. The Organ Committee reported the completion of their work and were discharged. The fides of the church have paid off \$5,000 of the debt on the organ and have \$1,200 on hand.

Reports were received from the Young People's Association, the Young Women's Missionary Committee, the Women's Missionary Society, and the Women's League, the latter reporting the raising of \$3,900 for the organ fund outside their other work.

The finishing of two rooms left to be completed by the Sunday School was asked by the School, and the matter was referred to the Finance and Building Committee for favorable action.

The Soldiers' and Sailors' Entertainment Committee reported the completion of their work.

New trustees for the year are J. M. Barnes, E. H. Cairns, D. W. Ledingham, J. W. H. Magee, A. Morrison, D. McCallan, H. McGowan, J. McMurray, D. R. Willet.

The unveiling will take place at the Communion service on Sunday morning, the 25th instant.

At the close of the business meeting, the members enjoyed a social hour, a vote of thanks being tendered the Ladies' Aid for so kindly supplying the refreshments. The meeting closed with the singing of the Doxology.

St. Matthew's Church.
The annual meeting of the St. Matthew's Presbyterian Church, Douglas Avenue, was held last evening. The meeting opened with devotional exercises, conducted by the pastor, the Rev. H. D. Eisner. Harvey Keim was then elected chairman of the meeting, and Harry McLean secretary.

The reports of the various departments of the church were then read. The Sessions report was read by the clerk of the Session the Ladies' Aid, the Young People's Society, the Progressive and Enterprise Clubs, and all reported a most successful year, with substantial increases both in membership and finances.

The Sunday School collections were reported much larger than in previous years, especially the missions collection. The attendance was very good, and the school had been kept open all summer.

The amount allocated by the St. John Presbytery for the Forward Movement was unanimously adopted by the meeting.

The church trustees elected for the coming year were: J. F. Gregory, R. Brittain, J. Thornton, R. Carson, Isaac A. Galbraith and S. Galbraith.

Refreshments were served by the ladies of the congregation at the close of the meeting.
