

JUMPED FROM SUSPENSION BRIDGE, BUT NETTING HELD HIM HEAD DOWN IN MID-AIR.

BARNEY MCKEOWN'S ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE IN THE FALLS STRANGELY FRUSTRATED.

Thrilling Rescue by Passers-by, With Whom McKeown Fought That He Might Take the Fatal Plunge—Disordered by the Effects of Drink He Begged Them to Let Him Go.

With nothing but space between him and death, Young Barney McKeown, of Douglas Avenue swung head downward from the side of the Suspension bridge about 3.30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

A rescue was effected, but only under the most difficult of circumstances, for McKeown fought off his saviors, whose determination to rescue was equal only by their gallantry. A more thrilling scene has rarely been witnessed on either bridge.

McKeown, when he found his strength to be unavailing against his rescuers' grip, begged to be let go, and even continued his pleading after he had been handed over the netting, and in the clutch of the crowd, was being hurried toward Douglas Avenue.

BOSTON PARTY CAUGHT TONS OF RED SALMON. Dr. Heber Bishop Tells of Splendid Outing on the Moisie River, Labrador—Took 37 One Day.

Boston, July 6—An enviable fishing trip by a party of Bostonians came to a close last Friday, the results of which are reported by Dr. Heber Bishop, one of the party. They went as the guests of Mrs. W. Adams and included also Mr. Adams' son Walter, B. F. Dutton, Senator Alrich of Rhode Island and Henry B. Reed.

They fished about twenty miles up the Moisie river, in Labrador, and secured a total weight of 4,688 pounds, averaging 28 pounds apiece, leaving out the grise, or three-year-old fish. On their last day, with four rods busy, they caught 37 fish weighing 800 pounds.
