Washington, July 13—Two important insurgent speeches against the Canadian reciprocity bill were made today, when Senator Lafollette, of Wisconsin, and Bristow, of Kansas, introduced their amendments to that measure and spoke in favor of them and against the specific features of the pending bill.

Senator Lafollette excoriated President Taft's administration, not only with reference to the tariff legislation proposed, but also on his conservation policies.

Senator Bristow renewen his fight against the present augar tariff, and urged the repeal of the "16 Dutch standard" on imported sugar, which he declared operates entirely in the interests of the American Sugar Refining company.
