

Winnipeg region in the year 1875, and with the Plains Cree at Forts Carlton and Pitt, in the year 1876; also acted, in the year 1875, in securing a revision of the terms of Treaties Nos. 1 and 2. Appntd. a Commr. under Statute 38 Vict., cap. 53, respecting conflicting claims to lands of occupants in Manitoba, Jan. 1879. Elected to present seat on resignation of sitting mem. (now the Hon. Mr. Justice Cameron) Dec. 1878. Re-elected at g.e. 1879, and again at last g.e. A Conservative. *Toronto, Ont.; Redman Club; Toronto Club.*

MOWAT, Hon. OLIVER, Q.C., LL.D. (North Oxford.)

Eld. s. of the late John Mowat, Esq., formerly of Canisby, Caithness-shire, Scot., who, after serving in the British Army during the campaign in Portugal and Spain under Lord Wellington, came to Can. 1810, and settled at Kingston, by Miss Lovack; and bro. of the Rev. Pres. Mowat, of Queen's Univ., Kingston. B. in Kingston, 29 July 1830. Ed. there. M., 1846, Jane, second dau. of the late John Ewart, Esq., of Toronto. Studied law first with Hon. (now Sir) John A. Macdonald, and with Mr. Justice Burns. Was called to the Bar, U.C., in Hilary Term, 1842. Created a Q.C. 1856. A mem. of the Senate of the Univ. of Toronto; a boucher *ex-officio* of the Law Soc. of Ont., and head of the law firm of Mowat, Macdonald and Downey. Sat in the City Council of Toronto for two years. Has been Presdt. of the Canadian Institute, Toronto. Was a Commr. for consolidating Public General Statutes for Canada and Upper Canada, respectively, from 1856 to 1859. Sat in the Quebec Union Conference, 1864. Has been Presdt. of the Evangelical Alliance of Ont. since 1867. Was Prov. Secy. (in the Brown-Dorion Administration) from 2 to 6 Aug. 1858; Postmaster-Genl. (in the Simpfick Macdonald Dorion Administration) from May 1868 until March 1864; held the same office (in the Coalition Govt.) from June 1864 until 14 Nov. same year, when appntd. Vice-Chancellor of U.C., an office he resigned 25 Oct. 1872, on being called upon to form a new administration in Ont. Appntd. a mem. of the Ex. Council, and Attorney-Genl., 31 Oct. 1872. (*Salary, \$5,000*) As Vice-Chancellor was one of the Judicial Officers appntd. under 34 Vic. chap. 7 (Ont.) to inquire into and report upon Estate Bills in the Ont. Assen. Was Counsel for Ontario in July, 1884, on the argument before the Privy Council in England, of the Boundary Question between Ontario and Manitoba. Sat for South Ontario in
