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# I.S.S. STARTS DRIVE FOR OVERSEAS RELIEF

ISS EXECUTIVE Speaks to UNB Group

"The starving children of Europe and other war-torn regions shall be provided for." In this lies the main aim of a tremendous drive by the Canadian Appeal for Children (C. A. C.) as was disclosed Tuesday evening by Mrs. W. H. Clark from Toronto, who is Vice-President of the Canadian Y. W. C. A. and on the Executive Council of ISS.

Mrs. Clark was at UNB, however, not for the CAC but for the Canadian Council for Reconstruction through UNESCO (CCRU) and more specifically for ISS. The International Students' Service has been recognized by the Canadian government as the official canvasser of Canadian Universities. One of its aims is to raise money (a minimum quota of \$50,000 has been set) from the Universities. This money will be forwarded to Ottawa, Toronto, and will finally reach Geneva.
