Warriors still looking for a win

"We need a win so bad," said Port Credit senior football coach Peter Martin. Too bad said Gordon Graydon senior coach Arnie Pfeiff after his Hawks handled the Warriors 28-0 in Peel high school action Friday at Port Credit.

The win was Graydon's second of the year, the loss Port Credit's second.

The Warriors, who won the Peel championship in 1975 have won only once since then. That win came two years ago against Graydon.

The large, boisterous crowd and the hard-hitting, fired-up Graydon squad were evidence of the rivalry between the two schools. The Port Credit team was not.

"These guys are really hard to motivate," said Martin. "And they've got no football sense."

"We're always up for the game against Port Credit," said Pfeiff. "It's a super rivalry and it's good for football."

Pfeiff likes the rivalry and the way his team plays against Port Credit, but he doesn't always like what the referee sees.

"One of our guys got kicked out when he didn't do anything," said Pfeiff. "I saw the whole thing from the sidelines."

Graydon's Scott Woolnough was kicked out of the game for kneeling Port Credit's Vic Frasson. Port Credit's John Perrotta was

kicked out when a scuffle broke out immediately after the third quarter kneeling incident.

"I'm not pleased with the way they've been handling themselves," said Martin of his players.

Running back Steve Jones scored two touchdowns for Graydon while quarterback Reynold Mainse and running back Bob Meinichuk each scored one. Jones and Jeff Patton each scored on two-point conversions.

Gryphons axed

In other games Applewood blasted Glenforest 48-7, Lorne Park topped Clarkson 21-6, Streetsville handled Brampton 28-3 and T. L. Kennedy was shut out by Chinguacousy 23-0. Bramalea defeated Mayfield 27-7 and Turner crushed Central 35-0 in northern games.

In front 17-1 at halftime, Applewood piled on 31 points in the second half to coast to the win over Glenforest. Nelson Milhirs kicked two field goals and added six converts for the winners. Mark Romolock and Brian Walling scored a pair of touchdowns each for Applewood. Tony Visco and Steve Webb each scored on 10-metre passes from Tom Grantis. Derek DeCosta, who ran for 110 yards, scored Glenforest's only major. Mike Holloway booted the single.

Todd charged up

Todd Stansbury celebrated his first game as a Lorne Park Spartan by scoring two

touchdowns against his old mates — Clarkson Chargers. Lorne Park's 21-6 victory brought Clarkson back to earth after their 43-7 victory over Mayfield last week.

Steve Hart, son of coach Dave Hart, returned an interception for the other Spartan touchdown. Ricky Schlessinger kicked two converts and a single. Fullback Steve McMillan got the Clarkson major.

Lorne Park's victory sets up a battle for first place in the southwest tomorrow at Erindale (1-0).

Tigers fight back

Three Streetsville incomplete passes and a bungled punt attempt set up Brampton Centennial's field goal early in the first quarter. But Streetsville quickly recovered and led 21-3 early in the second quarter.

The only problem for the Tigers — besides a small backfield — is lack of competition in the northeast.

Malcolm MacKay, Vernon Pellizzari, Selwyn Everts and Anthony Joseph scored the Streetsville majors. Everts converted all four touchdowns.

"Almost before we put on our helmets we were down 17-0," said coach Dave Sands of Chinguacousy's shutout victory.

Thanks to a poor snap on a punt attempt, a punt off the side of the foot and a no yards penalty, Kennedy was down 14-0 after Chinguacousy had had only one offensive play.

Grid season over for Cawthra Park

The midget football season is over at Cawthra Park Secondary School before it started. The Panthers never stepped on the field.

Panthers could only attract 19 players. Coaches Jim McInnis and John Danson wanted a minimum of 24.

Cawthra Park forfeited its first game of the season to Morning Star scheduled for last Wednesday but hoped to attract enough players to complete the season. When they failed to do so, they forfeited the whole season.

Cawthra midgets forfeited their final game of the 1978 season because of injuries and a lack of dedicated players. Danson hoped 1979 would be a rebuilding year for the school's football program.

The team looked strong at the start of training camp when 40 players turned out. A check of eligibility records showed that the team's top seven, two-way players were too old.

"I don't think we'd have

to drop football if the truth had been told," said McInnis. "The players were disappointed but I think they were more upset with the seven boys for not letting on about their ages."

McInnis didn't think the injury risk was worth continuing the season. Too many players would have to go both ways. "It's too bad when you love football but you just can't take a chance," he said.

McInnis has been coaching football for eight years and Danson seven at Cawthra.

"We can't do anything if the boys don't want to play," said McInnis. "It may just be the nature of the boys in grade nine." He said many potential football players have jobs after school.

McInnis said the physical education staff will meet after the basketball and track seasons to see if the problem goes across all sports.

Cawthra does not have junior or senior football teams this year.

Louise tops run
