related to the question of debt. Instead of discussing the two subjects separately, he began, and concluded, with the discussion of our debt situation, weaving into a part of his statement the reference to the present position of reciprocal trade negotiations with the United States. It looks to me very much as if this were done to confuse the public mind in a proper understanding of both the question of debt and the question of trade, and further, to afford Mr. Bennett a chance to make the innuendo he did against the Government of the United States.
