The Coming Fruit Show

The Ontario Fruit, Flower and Honey Shew, held at Toronto each year, has come to be regarded as an educational institution that we could not very well do without. The re-markable growth of this Fair in the last few years has only been in keep-ing with the new interest that fruit growers are taking in up-to-date and pregressive methods. Not only have the quality of exhibits continually improved, but the number of districts represented is ever on the increase, thus showing that even in outlying fruit sections cultivation, fertilization and spraying are taking their proper place in orchard practice. The management of the show predict that the exhibit of flowers and fruit this year will be much ahead of any pre-vious year. Practically every fruit growing county in Ontario will be re-

growing county in Ontario will be re-presented by large exhibits and the other provinces of Canada as well will endeavor to show to fair visitors the kind of fruit that they produce. It has been impossible to secure a building large enough for the numer-ous exhibits in the centre of Toronto and accordingly fair visitors this year will take the cars for the exhibition grounds. To Prevent Sunscald

Sun scald has done great damage in our orchards. It will continue to do damage, until we apply ourselves energetically to its eradication. The energetically to its eradication. The following letter recently written by I. F. Metcalf, B.S.A., District Re-presentative of the Ontario Depart-ment of Agriculture, to the fruit growers of Manitoulin Island, will be of interest to fruit growers every-where whose trees suffer from sun-

"You may have had trouble with some of your younger trees dying this season and did not know what was the matter with them. Perhaps you thought it was blight, when it was something else. If you find at the crotches of the limbs—and in some cases along the limbs—spots where the bark is dead and shrunk-en, it is probably sunscald that did the damage. In many case you will the damage. "Sunscald is caused by getting a few very warm days early in the spring, such as you had last March. SIMPLEST METHOD OF ALL

"By far the easiest and simplest method is to give the trees a coating of whitewash the last thing in the fall, so that rain will not wash it of IThis white color will throw off the sun's rays instead of absorbing them. sun's rays instead of absorbing them, and thus acts as a protection. It will also protect the buds starting to soon in the spring. Every person having an orchard of young or tender trees in this northern district would do well to make a practice of applying whitewash to his trees the last

thing every fall.

"Of course there is only one way of applying the whitewash satisfactorily, and that is by means of a spray pump. This does not need to be a large outfit but should have plenty of power (or pressure as it is called for its size. Such an outfit as I have for its size. Such an outil as I have been using this past season (Spra-motor No. 0) should be a very satis-factory outfit. If you have not pur-chased a spray outfit yet, I would ad-vise you to go in with one or more of vise you to go in with one or more or your neighbors and buy one of these pumps.
