**WINNIPEG, MAN.**—Plans have been prepared for an extensive enlargement of the McClary Manufacturing Company's warehouse on Bannatyne avenue.—The A. Macdonald Company intend building an extensive wholesale grocery warehouse on Bannatyne ave.—The Canadian Northern Railway has purchased Fort Garry Park for terminal purposes. Plans for passenger station and other buildings are under way.—Tenders are being taken for erection of brick and stone buildings for the Havana Cigar Syndicate.—It is probable that new tenders will be invited for erection of Carnegie library building with a view to reducing the cost.—The plans prepared by the C. 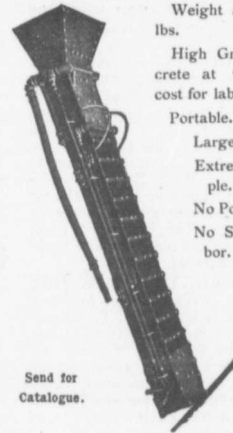

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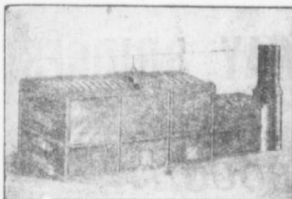
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
