

The skirt will be no trouble at all to make as it is a simple two-gored model, with the extra fulness disposed of by means of shallow plaits at front and back. The dress is marked by simplicity and good style, and there will be no diffi-

culty in making it if the pattern is care-One may choose any one of various materials which are suitable for this dress: for instance, poplin, serge, eponge, gabardine or fancy plaids. In wash materials there is gingham, chambray, percale or crêpe. Collar, cuffs and helt might be of

fine white piqué. The ladies' dress pattern No. 8204 is cut in four sizes-36, 38, 40 and 42 inches bust measure. Width at lower edge of skirt is 31/2 yards. To make the 26-inch size requires 5 yards 36-inch, 4 yards 44inch, 31/2 yards 36-inch contrasting material. All of one material requires 51/2 yards 36-inch, 4% yards 44-inch, 3% yards 54-inch.
