Moved by Code sec. by Richards that we adjourn to meet at 7.30 p. m. on Jan. 11th.

Moved by Code sec. by Fuller, that the treasurer's resignation be accepted when the books are audited and reports received of accounts by the Council.

By-law No. 95 appointing the several municipal officers was passed through its several readings.

Moved by Code sec. by Cooper that R. Phillips be appointed clerk, at a salary of \$40.00.

Moved by Cooper sec. by Fuller that A. McAuley be appointed treasurer at a salary of \$20.00.

Moved by Richards sec. by Code that H. T. Archer be appointed assessor at a salary of \$20.00.

Moved by Richards sec. by Code that the collector's time be extended to the 22th of Jan. and no longer.

By-law No. 97 appointing auditors passed through its several readings.

Moved by Code sec. by Cooper that Geo. H. Layng be appointed auditor.

The Reeve appointed Mr. W. S. Dodd, as his auditor.

Moved by Fuller sec. by Richards that the auditors, audit the books up to the time the books are transferred to the new treasurer.

By-law No. 97, appointing a Medical Health Officer passed its several readings.

Moved by Cooper sec. by Bryans that R. V. Fowler be appointed Medical Health Officer.

By-law No. 98 appointing a sanitary inspector passed through its several readings.

Moved by Richards sec. by Cooper that A. Copp be sanitary inspector.

Moved by Code sec. by Fuller that E. Williams be appointed constable.

Moved by Cooper sec. by Richards that the constable's salary be \$20.00.

Moved by Cooper sec. by Code that P. Lancaster's tender of \$40.00 for printing, be accepted.

Moved by Cooper sec. by Fuller that this council thank Mr. Dodds for his interest in the affairs of the village and Mr. Brady for his liberal offer in connection with fire protection.

Moved by Code sec. by Richards that the whole council be a committee to proceed with the matter of fire protection.

Moved by Richards sec. by Code that A. Kniewasser's offer of lighting street lamps at 25c per night be accepted.

Moved by Code sec. by Fuller that the reeve look after the matter of cleaning the snow off the sidewalks.

Moved by Code sec. by Fuller that the Council retain the services of Geo. J. Sherry, as solicitor, at a salary of \$10.00.

Moved by Code sec. by Richards that the treasurer's bonds be fixed at \$5000.

Moved by Code sec. by Fuller that the regular meeting of the Council be held on the first Monday in the month.
