**OUR APPLE PROSPECTS.**

Mr. Fred Pritchard, of Fred Pritchard & Co., of Liverpool, is in Kentville, and has during the last week been visiting various sections of the valley, looking at the apple crop. He has visited many fruit districts in different countries, and with his reports received from various places, he is in a position to give reliable information concerning fruit. We give below some notes which he has furnished us at our request.

Aug. 27th, 1902.

The crop of apples in Nova Scotia although very small in quantity, compares very favorably with that of Ontario, inasmuch as a much larger percentage of No. 1 Fruit is evident in this province than in Upper Canada.

As I have already advised, I do not consider Ontario has 15 per cent. No. 1 Fruit in accordance with the requirements of the Act, whereas here the quality in the heavily loaded sections which make up the crop is fairly good and in my opinion will make up 50 p. c. of good fruit in the Valley as a whole.

I am of the opinion that the large quantity of spotted fruit in Ontario will have a very short life as it will certainly not pay to export. With this spotted fruit out of the way, there will be very few apples for the winter months, and I recommend the holding of no. 1 winter stock for disposal in the English markets from Christmas on.

It is certain that for some time during the Fall months spotted fruit will be shipped and it is impossible to sell good stock for its true value in competition with it, hence, my suggestion to hold it over.
