OUR APPLE PROSPECTS,

Mr. Fred Pritehard, of Fred Pritchard & Co., of Liverpool, is in Kentville, and has during the last week been visiting various sections of the valley, looking at the apple crop. He has visited many fruit districts in different countries, and with his reports received from various places, he is in a position to give reliable information concerning fruit. We give below some notes which he has furnished us at our request.

The crop of apples in Nova Scotta although very small in quantity, compares very favorably with that of Ontario, inasmuch as a much larger per centage of No. 1 Fruit is evident. in this province than in Upper Canada.

As I have already advised, I do not consider Ontario has 15 per cent. No. 1 Fruit in accordance with the requirements of the Act, whereas here the quality in the heavily loaded sections v hich make up the crop is fairly good and in my opinion will make up 50 p. c. of good fruit in the Valley as a whole.

Least the control of t

as a whole.

I am of the opinion that the large quantity of spotted fruit in Ontario will have a very short life as it will certainly not pay to export. With this spotted fruit out of the way, there will be very few apples for the winter months, and I recommend the holding of no. I winter stock for di-posal in the English markets from "Christmas on."

Proceeds of sales will be paid by the direct to shippers on the Union Bank of Halifax, at par at any of its branches throughout the valley. I regret not being able to call on

on.

It is certain that for some time during the Fall months spotted fruit will be shipped and it is impossible to sell good stock for its true value in competition with it, hence, my suggestion to hold it over.

I have pleasure in advising my cfill bank of Halling at the valley. I regret not being able to call on all my friends this season, as early shipments from the States and Canada make my hasty return to Liverpool absolutely necessary.
