ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may now claim a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta.

The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent), and cultivate 50 acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right, and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts, price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

TREASURES OF TURKEY

GREAT COLLECTION OF JEWELS KEPT IN ROOM IN PALACE.

Throne and Many Robes of Past Sultans Are Inclosed With Thousands of Gems—Privilege of Seeing Treasures Gained Only by Influence—The Chamber Is Jealously Guarded at All Times.

R. J. Turner, an interesting article in the London Academy headed "Turkey's Treasure House," discusses the marvelous collection of jewels and curiosities that are in a corner of the harem of the palace, known as the treasury.

"Here, in all conscience," says Mr. Turner, "is lost enough alone to justify a triumphant entry into the ancient city of Constantinople and to make the mouths water of the Bulgarian or Serbian hosts if they were permitted to cross the threshold of the treasure chamber."

"In the time of Abdul Hamid access to this veritable cave of Abdullah was difficult to obtain. Ambassadorial intervention in the case of Europeans was necessary, and that always successful. Since the advent of Mahmud and the Young Turk, viewing privileges have been extended, but the signature of the grand vizier is still necessary to insure the unlocking of the famous portals."

"The procedure for a private view is quite an affair. After passing the sentries at the gate of the palace and reporting one's arrival in the courtyard, a stately procession of befezzed and frock-coated officials, headed by a venerable Bede, issues from a side building. The guard comes to attention. Before the huge key is inserted in the lock the seal of the door is broken by the venerable one and carefully borne away. A distinct effort is required to turn the lock. The door opens only to reveal another barrier which is as solemnly unlocked. The black-coated procession flows in and takes up strategic positions.

Bringing the Sea to Rome.

Projects for making Rome a seaport have been discussed for years past. One of these is to lay out on a seaport of a thirty-five foot depth near Castel Fusaro, formed by running two jetties out into the sea for some distance, and at the port of Anagnino, Holland.

From the port will lead a ship canal 15 miles long and 200 feet wide and 27 feet deep. At Rome adequate shipping accommodations will be laid out in the river below the city, and this will be connected with the navigable part of the Tiber by a system of docks. It will cost about \$15,000,000 to carry out the project.

ACROBATIC FISH.

Leaping Powers of the Tarpon, the Salmon and the Trout.

A considerable number of fishes are remarkable for their leaping powers, and several of these performers are on that account specially favored by anglers, since by jumping clear of the water, in some cases many times in succession, they tax the fisherman's skill more severely than fishes less active, and thereby give added zest to their capture.

Members of the salmon family are universally famous for their high jumps. The sea trout, which gladden Devon rivers under the name of "harvest peal," are unfailing acrobats, and a fish of a pound weight will more than once jump several times its own length out of water when hooked before coming to the net. Unless the fisherman responds by promptly lowering the tip of his rod, the fragile creature is likely to part, and as it is part of every sportsman's creed to appreciate his pastime in proportion to the difficulties it presents, the sea trout stands high in the angler's estimation.

This readiness to jump when hooked distinguishes the lively spring salmon from the more sluggish run of an autumn fish, which rarely clears the water in its efforts to throw out the maddening hook.

Precisely why these October fish should be less nimble than those of March has never been satisfactorily explained, but the higher temperature of rivers in the fall of the year may perhaps have something to do with their conspicuous indisposition.

At their best salmon can jump at least ten feet above the surface, a feat achieved by slapping the water with the powerful tail and flexing the body until the head and tail all but meet.

The association of the maximum of vigor and activity in fishes with a low temperature enjoys wide acceptance, but should be received with caution in view of the fact that nowhere perhaps in the world's seas are jumping fish more continually in evidence than in the Gulf of Mexico.
