DECISIVE BATTLE.

Intense interest in the outcome of the developments of the next 24 hours.

CAPTURED A FLAG.
Atkerston, near Dewetsdorp, Saturday, April 21.—Fighting was continued to-day, mainly with the air.

The Boers are well entrenched and hold their ground tenaciously. The British casualties have been light.

FIGHTING AT WEPENER.
London, April 23.—A despatch to the Times from Jammersburg, dated Saturday, says: "The Boers are displaying renewed activity. Five guns were used freely to-day from four new positions against ours. Rifle fire from the south and west was heavy and continuous."

"Officers and men are on duty day and night in the trenches and the heavy rains of late have made their task a feat of endurance and pluck."

The Boers are still there. Lord Roberts has ordered Lord Methuen to retire from Boshof, probably for the same reason, the presence of a Boer force at Frankfort looks like an intention to endeavor to cut off Methuen, who may next be heard of as retreating upon Kimberley.

The Boers are said to have encircled Bloemfontein in the eastward, in a crescent formation. There have been several outpost affairs in that vicinity.

The eleventh division under, Gen. De la Rey, are operating towards Sannas Post. In Natal there is no diminution of Boer activity.

It is reported that Sir Chas. Warren is to be appointed governor of the Free State. Nothing is known regarding Sir Redvers Buller, but there is little doubt regarding his removal and rumor has it that Lord Kitchener will get an important independent command.

The Daily News has the following from Lorenzo Marquez, dated Friday, April 20: "It is reported here that Gen. Devet has been killed. Other European ambulance corps beside the Irish-American are taking up arms in behalf of the Boers. The latter are unable to obtain snipers' powder."

"Trenches are being constructed for eight miles around Pretoria. There are 69 guns in position at Kroonstad and seven French guns at Pretoria."

Gen. Devet has been charged with dynamite and the Johannesburg fort has been dismantled."

CAUSES OF ACTION

In the Civil Suits Which are to be Tried Here

Are Mostly Claims For Damages—One a Slander Case.

There are seven jury cases and two non-jury cases at the assizes which opened Tuesday afternoon before Chief Justice Armour.

The first case on the jury list is Park Bros. vs. Campbell, an action to recover possession of a threshing engine sold to James Allen. The case came up before Judge Bell at the December sittings but was postponed to this court. Wilson, Kerr and Pike will appear for the plaintiffs and Fraser and Bell for the defendant.

In the case of Wellington Somerset vs. Henry Jewell, both parties to the action are farmers. Somerset claims \$2,000 damages for slander. W. F. Smith is for the plaintiff; Lewis & Richards is contra.

The alleged slander in this case is a charge of horse stealing.

The case of Ludlum and Fuller vs. M. Wilson is a suit on contract. J. B. Rankin appears for plaintiff, and J. G. Kerr contra.

Locke vs. Tilbury West is an action for under a contract. Rankin, J. C. for plaintiff; Wilson and Co. contra.

Tenant et al vs. Lunness et al is an action to recover \$615 alleged to be due on a hay deal. Wilson & Co. for plaintiffs; Oiler & Co. contra.

Montgomery vs. Duff an action to recover \$800 for loss of hogs through the alleged responsibility of the defendant. Wilson & Co. for the plaintiff; Rankin, J. C. contra.

Sager vs. Hadley Lumber Co. an action to recover \$1000 damages for injuries alleged to have been sustained while in the defendants' employ. Lewis & Richards for the plaintiff; Pearson & Denton contra.

Hicks vs. Johnston, a non-jury case, is a remnant from last court. O'Neill for plaintiff; McDonald contra.

Gibbons also non-jury is an action on account. Fraser for plaintiff; Graydon & Graydon contra.
