In the doorway and around about the building and in the room where she sits are the pale faces of the poor. She listens to their plaint, she pities their woe, she makes garments for them, adjusts the manufactured articles to suit the bent form of this woman and to the cripple invalid comes crawling on his hands and knees. She gives a coat to this one, she gives sandals to that one. the gifts she mingles prayers and tears and Christian encourage-Then she goes out to be

greeted on the street corners by those whom she has blessed, and all through the street the cry is heard, 'Dorcas is coming!"
