GLOVER ARRIVES.

First of Chatham's South African
Heroes to Arrive.

Over 1,000 People Meet Him at the
Station—Received by the
Mayor and Corporation.

Trooper Glover was the first of the
Chatham boys who went to fight for
England, to return from South Africa.
He arrived on the noon train to-
day and the station was jammed with
a large crowd assembled to welcome
him. Everywhere were flags and ev-
erywhere smiles and happiness. Chat-
ham desired to show her appreciation
and Chatham showed it. The train
was an hour late but the crowd waited
good-naturedly. When Trooper Glover
stepped from the train, a stalwart,
manly fellow, the crowd, cheering,
throwing their hats and wildly enthu-
siastic, surrounded him. His sister,
Mrs. For, was the first to greet him
with a kiss. Then his father and oth-
er relatives returned the same warm
greeting. Literally carried by the
push of the crowd, the hero from
South Africa was then elevated to a
seat in the carriage which had been
prepared for him. The carriage was
covered with white and gaily decorated
with flags bearing the glorious en-
sign of Old England. He was then
presented with a beautiful bouquet.

The members of Court Pride of Dover,
A. O. F., of which Trooper Glover is
a member, had escorted the returned
soldier to the carriage. Then, with-
out a second's hesitation, they took
the horses from the cab, fastened a
rope to it and about 40 of the mem-
bers of the A. O. F. pulled the carriage
to the park. The Dover Centre Band
had broken up so the residents of that
place secured the Excelsior Band to
welcome Trooper Glover for them.

This band headed the parade playing
Soldiers of the Queen. The came
Trooper Glover with his sister, Robert
A. Glover, and his little sister in a cab
which also contained Ald. Sulman,
drawn by the stalwart Foresters.
Then came the Dover Council in car-
riages. They were Reeve John Grant
and Councillors Timothy O'Neill, Jos.
Lewis, Regis Trudell, C. W. Wright
and Clerk John Welsh.

The City Band came next, and fur-
nished excellent marching music for
the C. C. I. cadets, who 50 strong, un-
der Col. Black and Capt. Tackaberry,
made good showing. Mayor Smith,
Chairman Dunlop of the Board of
Health, J. E. Thomas of the Board of
Commerce, City Clerk Merritt, Chair-
man Wilson of the School Board, Ald.
Liddy, Ald. Geo. Stephens, Ald. Mar-
shall, Ald. Fleming, Ald. McKeeugh,
Ald. McGee, Ald. Taylor, and the sur-
rounding crowd followed in carriages. Some
15 or 20 C. C. B. students decorated
in flags, added life to the
occasion and contributed to the gen-
eral rejoicings with cannon fire crack-
ers.

Glover was cheered all along the
route, and when the park was reached
was loudly cheered. The surround-
ing crush of men prevented his
being habonized.

Councillor Wesley Wright, of Dover,
and Andrew Brown, both members of
court, presented him with a sword.
The soldier from the carriage and bore
him on their broad shoulders up to
the grand stand, where surrounded by
Major Rankin, the Mayor, council and
others, speeches were made and music
furnished by the Excelsior and City
bands.

Major Rankin in full regimental mar-
shalled the parade.

About 70 from Court Pride of Dover, A.
O. F., besides many others attended the
welcome to Glover.

Glover was attired in a khaki colored
uniform, the regulation attire of the British
soldiers in South Africa. He looks well
considering his sickness and took his hearty
welcome gracefully. His friends say that
when he left but this is not surprising con-
sidering his long sickness.

Court Hope, A. O. F. of Chatham, was
well represented in the parade.

THE SPEECHES.
Trooper Glover was short and to the point. Trooper
Glover was presented by the Mayor
with a gracefully worded and patri-
otic address congratulating him on his
noble services and safe return to his
relatives, friends and native township
of Dover. This address wound up
with the presentation of the freedom
of Chatham. Mayor Smith, in a very
happy vein, and on behalf of the
citizens, welcomed the guest of the
day, and emphasized the noble part
which Canadian soldiers had taken in
the South African campaign. He
thought that a monument should be
erected to the late Private Donegan
in Tecumseh Park, and would sub-
scribe liberally towards such an ob-
ject.

Trooper Glover, who was dressed in
the historic khaki, responded in a
speech of military and Grant-like
brevity.

Major Rankin then took the stand
and explained the circumstances
which, owing to the draft having fol-
lowed Col. Herchmer from Cape Town
to Calgary, prevented the Canadian
soldiers from receiving the money so
generously subscribed for them by
Chatham citizens. However, he had
much pleasure in presenting Trooper
Glover with his share and hoped the
others would call on him for theirs
when they returned.

J. A. Wilson, on behalf of the For-
esters, added his congratulations.
Bro. Glover left in good standing in
the lodge and they followed his career
with interest. Canada would always
follow where the British flag led.

John Grant, Reeve of Dover, added
a cordial welcome on behalf of the
municipality of that township, and the
proceedings terminated with cheers
and hand-shaking.
