TWO FOUND DEAD

A Peculiar Find in a New York Apartment Building.

New York, May 29.—Police men, attracted by the shouts of alarmed residents in an apartment building at 50 Second avenue, early to-day, broke open the door of one of the flats and found J. S. Keldain, a dealer in cigarettes, lying on the floor with his skull crushed. In an adjoining room, lying on a bed, was N. Caraban, a tobacco merchant. Caraban was shot through the head. In one hand he held a pistol, and near him was a hammer. The police believe he attempted to kill Keldain with the hammer, and then shot himself. The cause of the quarrel is not known. Both were taken to Bellevue Hospital, and will die, the doctors say.

RICE TO DIE

Toronto, May 29.—The Court of Appeal this morning gave judgment in the long-pending appeal of Fred. L. Rice against his conviction for the murder of Constable Wm. Boyd on June 4, 1901.

Rice was one of the trio of bandits who held Boyd while trying to escape from a cab in which they were being conveyed to jail. Jones was fatally shot during the fight, and Rutledge afterwards committed suicide. Rice was convicted of Boyd's murder, although it was not proved that he fired the fatal shot, the conviction being based on the Crown's claim that there was a conspiracy to escape, and that the murder was committed by one of the three in pursuance of the conspiracy. The Court of Appeal held that the conviction was a proper one, and that the verdict of the jury must be given effect to. Rice will be sentenced to death on Monday.

Mr. T. C. Robinson, however, proposes to make a further effort to save his client's life. He will seek leave to appeal to the Supreme Court before Monday, and if that is not granted he will after sentence, endeavor to have Rice taken before the Supreme Court on a writ of habeas corpus. Rice has relatives who will do everything possible to delay the carrying out of the sentence.

MORGAN LIGHTS

London, May 28.—The system of electric lights in St. Paul's Cathedral, which was donated by J. Pierpont Morgan, was formally inaugurated to-night in the presence of the cathedral officials, and a number of London journalists. The effect of the new lights was magnificent; they brought out the architectural features of the building in a soft and beautiful manner, and infinitely better than did the old system of illumination.

It has been decided, however, that an additional installation of electric lights, to cost £3,000 to £4,000, is desirable. Mr. Morgan has offered also to supply this second installation.
