A regular meeting of the Municipal Council of the Township of Harwich, was held in the township hall, on Monday, July 14th 1902, at 10 a. m.

Members present: P. Morrison, reeve, Buchanan, McCormick, Bentley and Wilson, councillors.

The minutes of the previous regular meeting, on June 9th also those of the previous special held at P. McCormick's on June 21st, last, were read, adopted by the council, and signed by the reeve.

Bentley—Wilson—That a hearty vote of thanks be tendered to Mr. Peter McCormick, by the township council, for the hospitality shown to its members, on the 21st day of June last, and that a copy of the resolution be sent to Mr. McCormick—Carried.

An application for damages against the township of \$25.00, was entered by Mr. Robert Jackson, who claimed that amount of damage was done to his crops, owing to the backing up of water from the road ditch.

The council have the matter under consideration.

An application for the position of collector of taxes for the year 1902, was received from Mr. Robert L. Smyth, this being the only application received by the council, was accepted and entered in the by-law prepared, upon the motion of Buchanan, and seconded by Wilson.

On account of the great number of sheep that are being worried and killed by dogs in the township, the council took the matter into consideration, and upon the motion of Wilson, seconded by Bentley, it was resolved that this council grant a reward of \$3.00 to any person or persons giving satisfactory evidence to this board, for the destruction of each and every dog, which is caught in the act of killing sheep, upon the condition that the dog be killed, and the head of the dog be brought to the township of Harwich, on or after this date of June 14th, 1902.

McCormick—Wilson—That the clerk be instructed to write to the Canada Supply Co., asking them to send a representative to meet the reeve, to take measurements for an iron span of 25 feet to be added to the bridge—Carried.

Wilson—Bentley—That the clerk be instructed to correspond with W. G. McGeorge, asking him to forward the report on the Nash creek drain as soon as possible—Carried.

Buchanan—Wilson—That the clerk be instructed to write the manager of the L. E. & D. R. R., and ask to have them place a 15 inch sewer pipe as the water from the recent rains has backed up almost to the level of the road—Carried.

Bentley—Buchanan—That the statute of labor of Matthew Steele be computed for a term of four years upon the condition that he grade a certain portion of Road 18 side road, as specified by the council—Carried.

An application was made by Mr. P. Crawford, pathmaster at Erleau, asking for some of the accumulated funds of the township to be expended in improving the public road and sidewalk at Erleau.

Wilson—Bentley—That \$100.00 be paid to the road division at Erleau, this amount having been paid into the general fund of this township, by the rate payers of the said division, and that C. Buchanan, commissioner of ward 3, and Mr. Crawford, pathmaster at Erleau, be appointed to see that the said money is properly expended—upon resolution were ordered paid.

To Keep Pickles Sweet. Pickles should be kept in unglazed earthen jars or wooden kegs. Sweetenings keep best in glass jars; unglazed stone pots answer very well for common fruit. A paper wet in brandy or good spirits and laid on the preserver fruit tends to keep it from fermenting. Each pickle and sweetenings should be watched to see that they do not ferment, particularly when the weather is warm. Whenever they ferment, turn off the vinegar or sirup, scald and turn it back while hot. When pickles grow soft, it is owing to the vinegar being too weak. To strengthen it, heat it scalding hot, turn it back on the pickles, and when lukewarm put in a little alum and a brown paper wet with molasses. If it does not grow sharp in the course of three weeks it is past recovery and should be thrown away and fresh vinegar turned on, scalding hot, to the pickles.
