Pickles should be kept in unglated barthen jars or wooden kegs. Sweetmeats keep best in glass jars; unglated stone pots answer very well for common truit. A paper wet in brandy or proof upirit and laid on the preserver truit tends to keep it from fermenting. Beth pickles and sweetmeats should be watched to see that they do not ferment, particularly when the weather is warm. Whenever they ferment, turn off the vinegar or sirup, scald and turn it back while hot. When pickles grow soft, it is owing to the vinegar being too weak. To strengthen it, heat it scalding hot, turn it back on the pickles, and when lukewarm put in a little alum and a brown paper wet with molasses. If it does not grow sharp in the course of three weeks it is past recovery and should be thrown away and fresh vinegar turned on, scalding hot, to the pickles. Breeding From Young Fillies.

The question whether it is wise to breed flies at two years old, has been more than once asked by correspondents in the last few months and, in replying, caution has been advised in resorting to this unless in cases where the filly is vigorous and well developed. We notice that the same question is being discussed in Britain, and from the Farmers' Gazette of recent date we quote: "With reference to the advisability or otherwise of breeding from young fillies, well-known breeder of horses, writes to inform us that he himself has, for years, bred very successfully from animals of this age, and has never known any injurious results to have followed from the practise. Much depends, in cases of this kind upon the filly herself. If the animal belongs to a vigorous family of horses, possesses a good constitution, and has been well 'done,' in her first and second seasons, no great harm may be caused by putting her to the stallion at the age mentioned, but in the generality cases we find that not only is the foal produced less robust and less vigorous in its constitution the produce of a fully-matured mare, but that the development of filly herself is so much arrested that she very seldom grows into as fine a mare as another of the same age, and kept under the same conditions, but not bred from until he third or fourth year. If indulged in at all, our experience is that breeding from two-year-old fillies should only be attempted where the animal are, as above indicated, of sound, vigorous constitution, and where they have been kept in the best condition right through from the time of foaling. Much may also be done to counteract the injurious effects of early breeding if precautions are tak-en to work the animals lightly and feed them liberally during the time they are carrying their first foals."


