ROMANCE OF CHURCH CHOIR

Woes of an Eloping Couple in Chicago who Fled to Michigan.

Newspaper Man and Lady Organiste tall Victims to Cupid and Incidentally to Swindle s too.

Chicago, Aug. 5. - A. shurch choir romance in Chillicothe, O., an elopement to Chicago, and an encounter with swindlers, who got their money and left them stranded, are three chapters in the life story of John P. Brand, of Bellefontaine, O., and Miss Carrie V. Sleret, of Chillicothe. Brand is the son of J. C. Brand,

cashier of the Bellefontaine National Bank in Bellefontaine, O., and Miss Sleret is the daughter of a jeweler and optician in Chillicothe. The swindlers into whose hands

they fell and who swindled them by means of a "fake" divorce suit are Herman Ewald, now in the county jail, and a man who gave the name of Stacer.

The flight of Brand and Miss Sleret from Chillicothe has not been followed by detectives.

Brand's wife is Mrs. Hattie Wright Brand, state organizer for Indiana of the Woman's Unristian Temperance Inion. She has not lived with Brand for several years and was not in-terested in his disappearance. Miss Sleret's parents have been

anxious to keep the elopement a secret, and have not followed their recreant daughter.

Brand is employed as a proofreader on a Chicago paper, and had it not been for the trouble with the swin-dlers they might have remained hidden while Brand quietly obtained the divorce he wishes from his wife, when the pair could marry.

ROMANCE BEGAN IN CHURCH. The romance began a year ago when Brand went to Chillicothe to edit a newspaper. There he joined the choir of the Congregational church. Miss Sleret was the organist. She is about 27. The romance budded under the influence of choir rehearsals. The parents of Miss Sleret investi-

gated. They learned that Brand was already married. They opposed the intimacy. Apparently the opposition of the parents had the usual effect, for Miss Sleret did not abandon Brand.

Her parents sent her to Chicago on June 1 in the hope of separating her from Brand. Brand boarded the same train as Miss Sleret and they came to Chicago together.

One night Brand met a man, who gave the name of James H. Ewald, in a saloon. Under the mellowing influence of a few drinks, Brand told his troubles. Ewald saw an oppority and, representing a lawyer, offered to get a divorce for Brand. The latter eagerly fell in, and advanced \$200 to pay for the divorce. Ewald pretended to file a bill in the Superior Court, and kept Brand in hopes of a divorce until his money gave out. Then Ewald planned to secure Miss Sleret's jewelry.

SWINDLERS USED COURTS. At this juncture Stacer, the con-federate of Ewald, appeared. He swore out warrants for the arrest of Brand and Miss Sleret before Justice

Davidson, of Melrose Park.

The warrants charged both with a statutory offense, and charged Brand in addition, with perjury in making affidavit to the effect that he had resided in the state a year.

The warrants were placed in the

nanes of Constable Peter Lager. The constable was not aware of the olot to obtain Miss Sleret's jewelry. Brand appealed to Lawyer Joseph R. Burres, who went on their bonds. Stacer was beside himself with anger, and told the constable that he had missed a good thing, because they had fixed it up with the justice that no one should be accepted on the prisoners' bonds but Stacer, who was to demand Miss Sleret's jewelry as security, and if it was secured, Ewald would advise his clients to leave the state, in which case the

jewelry put up as security for the bonds would be forfeited. PUT ON JUSTICE'S SHOES. When Lawyer Burres and his clients reached Melrose Park on the day set for the trial, Justice Davidson's office was locked. His residence was found and his wife admitted he was at home. Mr. Burres insisted on seeing him, where the justice was stretched out on a couch. He was without coat, vest and shoes, and when his wife awakened him, he asked Burres to and was admitted to a back room consent to a continuance of the case. The lawyer was not to be put off, nowever. He took the justice's shoes and put them on his feet. He gave him his coat and vest, and helped him on with them, and marched him down to his office. There was nothing for the justice to do but dismiss the

charge. Ewald has been arrested, and is the county jail.

Brand and Miss Sleret went to South Haven, Mich., immediately after their discharge by Justice Davidson.
