Car lots, west are quoted at 49 1/2c. and east at 50c. Rye—Easy. New rye, 46c. west, and 47c. east. Buckwheat—Quiet. Car lots, west, are quoted at 49c. and east at 50c. Oats—Firm. Choice new white oats, middle freight are selling at 26c. and east at 27c. Light white oats and mixed oats, east and west, 24c. Flour—Firm. NEW NATIONAL PARK LAID OUT.

It is in New Ontario and From 40 to 50 Miles Square.

Toronto, Jan. 9.—At a meeting of the Ontario Cabinet yesterday, 1,400,000 acres of land surrounding Lakes Temagami and Lady Evelyn, in Northern Ontario, were set apart as a forest reserve. The result of the setting apart of the Algonquin Park as a forest reserve and pleasure ground has been so beneficial that the government resolved to add a park in the Temagami region to the reserves. The area now set apart is about 40 to 50 miles and rectangular in form. It contains about five billion feet of pine, and for the present none of this will be cut and no settlement will be allowed. Later if pine is to be cut there will be provisions for the re-foresting of the area cut over. The new park contains the head waters of many important rivers, and a part of the reason for reserving it is that the experience elsewhere has proved that the forests are the great preservers of moisture and a steady river flow.
