ROCKEFELLER FOUND.

Served With Subpoena at Pittsfield—Caught by a Ruse.

Pittsfield, Mass., July 4.—John D. Rockefeller accepted service in person of the subpoena issued by Judge Landis of the Federal Court at Chicago at the summer home of his son-in-law, E. Parmlee Prentice, in this city, yesterday.

The subpoena directs Mr. Rockefeller to appear before the Federal Court at Chicago on July 6.

Service was affected, according to Deputy Marshal Frink by a ruse on his part. The deputy marshal explained later that he was not satisfied with the condition of affairs at Mr. Prentice's estate as he found them on an earlier visit yesterday, and after apparently leaving Pittsfield for his home in North Adams he returned unexpectedly to Taconic Farm, the Prentice estate. He saw Mr. Rockefeller sitting on the front piazza. Mr. Rockefeller greeted his visitor with a smile and accepted service in person. He said that he had not been trying to evade service, but he did not exactly understand what was wanted of him. After accepting service, Deputy Marshal said, Mr. Rockefeller shook hands with the deputy and expressed pleasure at meeting him.

TELLER DECAMPS WITH CASH.

\$96,317 of Windsor Trust Co.'s Money Is Missing.

New York, July 4.—Detectives throughout the United States are searching for Chester B. Runyan, paying teller of the Windsor Trust Co., who, the directors allege, is missing with \$96,317 in cash.

Runyan is accused of having placed \$96,317 in currency in a suit case last Saturday, and, after shaking hands with his banking associates, left the trust company. Since then he has not been seen.

Runyan, it is said, did not even go to his apartment to bid good-bye to his wife, to whom he had been married five years. He is said to have taken all the cash available in the bank last Saturday. The directors, it is stated, have made up all the loss of the defalcation.

Runyan was a man of exemplary habits, so far as known, and was a trusted employee. When the auditors went over his accounts on May 1 they were found to be all right.

SMASHED INTO STEAM BARGE.

R. & O. Steamer Prescott Does Considerable Damage.

Montreal, July 4.—The Richelieu & Ontario Navigation steamer Prescott was entering the first lock of the La Chine Canal last Tuesday when the wire of the signal bell from the wheelhouse to the engine-room broke, and the man at the wheel being unable to signal the engine-room to stop, the boat steamed straight into the second gate, smashing it to splinters.

The rush of water carried the first gate, which were, by this time, partly closed, and sweeping the steamer back into the canal basin, where she collided with the steam barge Havana, smashing in her stern. The Havana sank, but the crew were saved without trouble.

The Havana had a load of pulpwood. The Prescott was little damaged. The canal was repaired during the day.

\$2,000 FIRE AT HAMILTON.

Explosion On Gasoline Launch the Cause—Several Boats Burned.

Hamilton, July 4.—J. W. Castell, son of ex-Sergeant Castell, was seriously burned last evening by the explosion of a steam launch, and a \$2,000 fire was started which destroyed two boat-houses, a number of boats, and did damage to the extent of about \$1,500 to the Acacia. Mr. Castell had a close call.

Jumped Into the River.

Binghamton, N. Y., July 4.—Meritt Treadwell, one of the oldest letter-carriers in Southern New York, committed suicide here yesterday by fastening an anchor to his wrist and jumping into the Susquehanna River. Treadwell completed his morning's work and borrowed a boat from a fellow-carrier rowing into deep water, where he plunged in.

Does Not Suit Longshoremen.

Montreal, July 4.—The award of the board of conciliation and investigation in the trouble between the longshoremen and shippers of Montreal has been accepted by representatives of 17 shipping companies, but is unsatisfactory to the men.

Drug Clerk's Tragic End.

Winnipeg, Man., July 4.—G. J. Griffin, drug clerk, committed suicide last night by cutting his throat, and then jumping out of a second-storey window at his boarding-house.

Killed By Fall From Bridge.

Alvinston, July 4.—Alton Irving, six years of age, son of John Irving, tailor of Alvinston, fell off the overhead Grand Trunk Railway bridge and died shortly after.

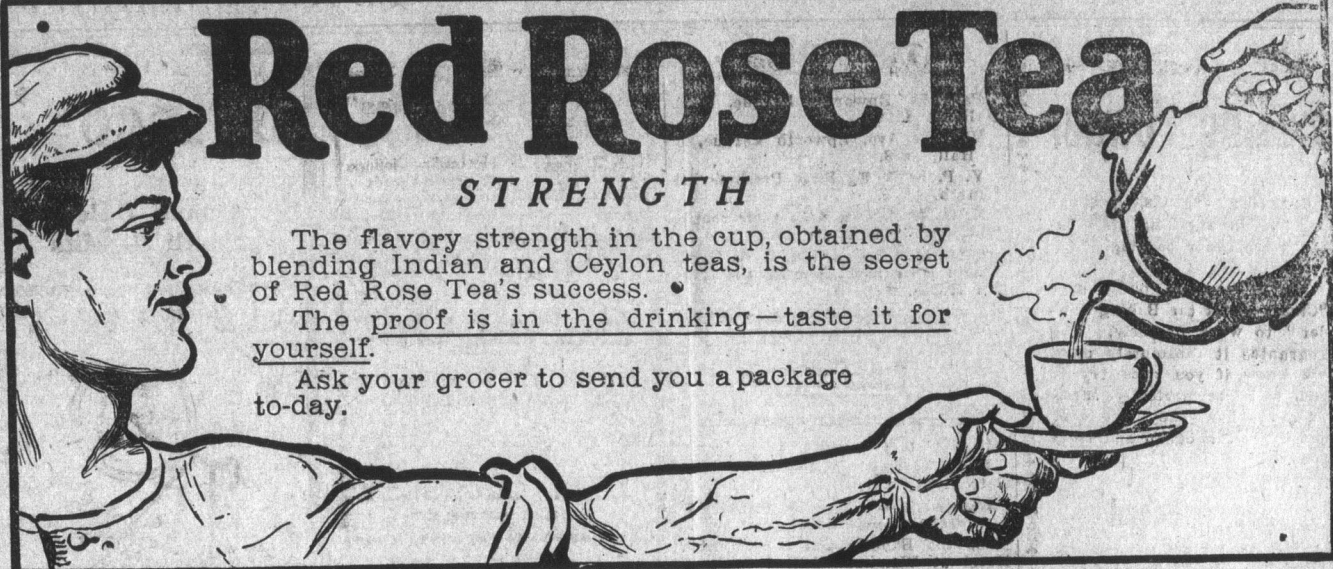
