BIG GAME IN NEW BRUNSWICK

An Address Delivered By L. A. Gagnon, Chief Warden for New Brunswick, Before The International Commission of Game and Fish Conservation at Madison, Wisconsin.

New Brunswick is advertised as the best big game country in Eastern Canada. It is also spoken of as the Hunter's Paradise and sportsmen come from all corners of the continent to hunt and fish. In a brief general way I wish to present the big game situation in our province as it exists today, for I feel we have conditions not common to most of our neighbors, but interesting to any activity engaged in the preservation or protection of fish and game.

By big game is meant moose, caribou and deer. The moose are still plentiful. During the open season of two months our sportsmen still take out heads with sixty last species, and there with five feet of daylight between the tips. It is but five years ago since the record head with a spread of 2 feet was secured in this province. The caribou are scarce since the epidemic of a few years ago, and there has been a close season since 1912. But the deer are very plentiful. Everywhere there are deer. They destroy the farmers' crops, they play in the pastures amongst the cattle, and are generally regarded as a common pest by the farmers, the same as cutworms and squash bugs. In the woods they are numerous and "survive" fairly well through the long winters of deep snow. Then of course there are bears, numerous enough to occasionally raid the sheep pens in the back settlements. One appearance often take back bear pelts.

As to why New Brunswick is the chosen home of big game is due to a combination of many favorable conditions. Probably the main one is the large amount of forest land. The province, which is about half as large as New York State, and about six times as large as Massachusetts, has a population of less than 400,000. It is essentially a forest province, with over 60 per cent of forest, making its acres of forest per capita. In fact, it was divided up every man, woman and child, or at least every family, would have a fair-sized hunting preserve. Over half the forest area is in the Crown Land. From the province is not overstocked at all. Settlement is confined pretty much to the fertile valleys and sea coast, where the people make a comfortable living on a small portion of the area, and the 35 per cent is kept for hunting, fishing and camping, and game preservation. Within the forest are the numerous kinds of plant life common to the North East, which these animals feed upon, and the many mud lakes and ponds contain the water plants favored by moose in the summer, and softwood forest supply food. The greater part of the forest area is far removed from civilization, the game is unharmed for ten months a year, and this vast area, so easily accessible, is yet unspoiled.

Then of course there are the protective methods adopted which play an important part in preventing the game from becoming extinct, and the wonderful climate which our tourists enthuse about, so that the game find it very suitable too.

Picture then, a province two-thirds forest, lake and stream, the home of big fish as well as big game, fringed with prosperous settlements and small towns, traversed by a network of railroads and automobile highways, and you have New Brunswick. Apply to this the charm of autumn days when the hillsides are clothed in a coat of many changing tints as early autumn mingles into the busy days of Indian summer, and you have New Brunswick in the hunting season.

A word as to the administration of fish and game protection. The enforcement of the game laws comes under the Forest Service of the Department of Lands and Mines. This is the only province in the Dominion as far as we know in the sister States where fish and game protection is a part of the Forestry Service. A permanent ranger staff is supplemented by special game patrols during certain periods of the year. The revenue from all forms of the game division amounted to \$100,000, while the per cent of the tax on this is spent on protection.

Game protection from the Forest Service viewpoint is looked upon as good business, although the revenue from timber cuts amounts to

seven to twelve times as much, depending on the condition of the lumber industry, while the cost of administration and protection of timber amounts to only about 10 per cent of the revenue received. This explains the attitude of the public towards game protection, and reveals a condition under which it is impossible without further public support to bring about any drastic changes whereby the province would become fully stocked with big game. This only alternative is by building up gradually of a stronger public opinion for game preservation, the same as is being done in forest fire protection, and already this policy has met with some measure of success. There is a realization by the Forest Service that the actual benefits derived from game protection cannot be measured in terms of money alone, but there must be a stronger public opinion before more attention—the matter of more protection and stricter laws can be paid to game protection. The government is working singlehanded. We have only one Forest and Game Protective Association, recently formed, and the Game Association of over 300 members, supporting the government in their stand towards game preservation as is prevalent in most states and provinces.

A word as to the present laws on big game. There is an open season on moose and deer from October 1st to November 30th. This season was shortened by two weeks to take effect this autumn for the first time, the open season for deer dating from September 1st, but there is a clause whereby non-residents if they wish may be allowed to hunt in September provided that an extra license be paid. The license for the big game hunting season is \$3.00 for residents and \$5.00 for non-residents, and the hunter is allowed to take but one bull moose and two deer. Last season, which was a normal one, 13,113 residents and 534 non-residents licenses were sold, and the official returns showed that 1018 moose and 1850 deer were shot. The non-residents come largely from Massachusetts, but there were hunters from some other states of the Union. The number of hunters from Great Britain has fallen off considerably since the war.

One of the most interesting phases of big game hunting in this province is the manner in which practically the whole forest area is divided. All non-resident hunters are accompanied by registered guides who have hunting licenses and camps all over the province. Each guide has his own territory and no guide trespasses on the territory of his neighbor. The unwritten law of the woods is strictly observed and there is the best of feeling existing between the guides. There are about 50 registered guides, having a valid license and permits to hunt in the forest land is free to hunt in by the residents or by non-residents accompanied by registered guides, but the residents hunt mainly near the settlements and do not interfere with the guides. It is the strict observation of this unwritten law that has had much to do in preserving the big game of this province. As to the guides the big game is carefully watched, it is to their interest that their districts remain well stocked with game, for it means more business for them and their greater money return. There are no private hunting preserves, and it is doubtful if there ever will be. An attempt has been made to lay out a large Game Refuge, but it did not receive the support of public opinion, and the fact was never enforced. Therefore it would appear that as long as the present system of hunting is carried on, as long as the present mode of guides and camps are able to take care of the non-resident hunters, it is felt there will always be moose and deer to hunt, although it is felt by many that there should be a further restriction on moose hunting for a time. All successful hunters however do not hunt moose every autumn, being content with a well-filled head secured on previous trips.

The whole system of big game protection in this province stands before any important change of policy is adopted. The matter of food supply is an important one in increasing the popularity of the game moose and deer during winter months, and

where of deep snow is another factor. The other provinces and states by protesting why our birds of record are not as good as those of the sister States, and no doubt if big game should become scarce in New Brunswick the same thing would be brought on as always has been in the past.

INSPECTION FOR ALL THE SCHOOLS

Medical Doctor Appointed For All Time Medical Inspection of Schools

Starting yesterday New Brunswick will be able to boast of being the only place in the world where there is an "all time" medical inspection in schools. Hon. W. F. Roberts, M.D., minister of health, announced yesterday afternoon that commencing today six medical inspectors will take over their new duties. The province has been divided into six districts as follows:

District No. 1—Madawaska, Kestiguche and Gloucester, under the supervision of Dr. Cro.

District No. 2—Northumberland, Kent, Westmorland, exclusive of Fredericton, under the supervision of Dr. LeBlanc.

District No. 3—Albert, Kings, Queens and Charlotte, under the supervision of Dr. King.

District No. 4—Victoria, Carleton, York and Sanbury, under the supervision of Dr. Bailey.

District No. 5—Cities of Moncton and Fredericton, and the town of St. Stephen, under the supervision of Dr. Legault.

District No. 6—St. John city and county, under the supervision of Dr. Hamilton.

While in the United States, Hon. Dr. Roberts arranged for three doctors to take a six weeks' post graduate course in January or February.
