ANY even numbered section of Dominion A Lands in Manitoba or the North-West Provinces, excepting 8 and 28, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of the family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 100 acres, more or less. Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the person by the property of the proxy may, however, be made on certain conditions by the inter, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for entry or inspection made
personally at any Sub-agent's office may be
wired to the local Agent by the Sub-agent,

Machine men are now plentiful at Cobalt. It is estimated that fully 1,000 idle nands are waiting for positions with the various mines. Many are daily coming to the camp from the North, where they were employed prospecting during the Summer. The strike is now practically over.

The Temiskaming Mining Company is making great progress in its development work. The main shaft is down 260 feet, and every foot further new silver deposits are being opened Of three care of ore shipped by the mine, the first is worth \$125,000, and the other two are worth \$225,000.
