Summerside, which is one of the entrance ports of the Island will be thus brought to much nearer to Charlottetown. Both these measures when carried into effect will greatly facilitate trade and commence, and be the means of further developing the resources of the Island.

The delay in submitting the documents to the House is now fully explained.
