There are a number of cases at that place; and from the continual increase the situation is growing rather alarming. What the cause of this disease is we do not know as we were under the impression it was confined to hot climates, but there seems to be something contagious about it, there being now seven cases at Herring Neck, most of them otherwise healthy men; and no one knows who is the next able-bodied man to be attacked and possibly lose his summer's work. We direct the attention of our energetic Magistrate and the medical men to this state of affairs, and urge them to take some action to combat this terrible, numbing disease.
