CABLE NEWS.

LATEST WAR REVIEW.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.

(By the A.P.)—Frenzied counter attacks by a foe who realizes that the vitality of his defense are being eaten into, have failed to hold back the British and French armies, who are hard after the Germans on the seventy-five mile battlefield from the north of Arras to the region of Soissons. All along the front the German line has given way before the pressure of the British and French troops at points where the falling back of the enemy or the capture of towns and roads running eastward adds to his already precarious predicament on the standpoint of strategy. Numerous towns, villages and hamlets have fallen into the hands of the British and French in the continuation of the fight, and scarcely anywhere along the battlefield have the Germans been able to do more than delay the Allies when they knock for admission to the German line. Rearguard actions, in which innumerable machine guns are used, also are serving merely to keep the Allied advance slowed down as far as possible while the main German bodies make their way eastward in the retreat toward new positions. In the region around Arras the British now are well astride the roads leading to Douai and Cambrai, and farther south along the Somme they have pressed forward until they are almost at the gates of Peronne. Between the Somme and the Oise the French have broken the backbone of the German resistance at Roye, capturing this pivotal position to an invasion eastward of the plains of Picardy and advancing their lines north and south of the town over a front of about 12 and a half miles to a depth of more than two and a half miles at certain points. North of Soissons the French, although the Germans are fighting them bitterly, have advanced slightly their line in the outflanking movement both against the Chemin des Dames region and the Noyon sector. Everywhere the Germans have lost heavily in men killed or made prisoners, and in addition the Allied troops again have captured numerous guns, machine guns and war stores. The prisoners taken by the British from last Wednesday to Monday of the present week aggregate 21,000. In the fighting on Tuesday around St. Mar, west of Roye, the French secured 1100 captives. The Canadian troops are fighting in lively fashion between the Senece and Scarpe rivers. Bapaume, one of the strategic points over which there have been much fighting, is still held by the Germans, but the British are now so nearly around it that possibly a few enemy remain inside the shell-torn town. The British in the west are in the outskirts of the place, and doubtless it soon will be tipped out of the battle line in the pioneer movement that is being employed against it. In the north the British are already across the upper end of the old Hindenburg line, and if their progress continues they will soon be able to operate to the east of the line on unscarred ground, on which tanks and cavalry can be brought into the fray with good results. Behind the lines everywhere French and British armies are harassing the Germans in retreat, but at this work they are being met by large forces of the enemy, who are fighting hard in an endeavour to make secure the retreat movement of their foot soldiers. In the Vesle front the Americans and Germans are in a rather bitter fight in the towns of Fismette and Basouches. The Americans started the trouble at Basouches, and the Germans reciprocated with an attack on Fismette. At last accounts the Americans had the upper hand at both places. In East Siberia the entire Russian military forces have gone over to the support of the anti-Bolshevik leader.

NEW ADVANCE IN FLANDERS.

LONDON, Aug. 28.

British forces fighting east of Arras have reached the outskirts of Hancourt, Rimey and Boiry Notre Dame, north of the Arras-Cambrai road, according to the official statement issued by the war office to-day. The British line in the Flanders battle area has been advanced on a front of four miles astride the Neuf Berquin-Estaires road.

ON OUTSKIRTS OF NOYON.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMY IN FIELD, Aug. 23. (By the A.P.)—French cavalry this morning entered Neale. French infantry occupied the town of Cressy two and a half miles south east of Neale. The French third army to-day captured Dives and pushing to the eastward reached the outskirts of Noyon. The retreat of the Germans was much quickened at some parts of the line to-day, while south east of Roye the entry into action of German guns of all calibres stanchied the French pursuit.
