### Manicipation of Slaves.

William Wilberforce, the celebrated philanthropist, was born at Hull in 1759, and will be ever remembered for his unwearied exertions during a period of twenty years for the abolition of negro slavery. He was educated at Cambridge when only fourteen wrote a letter to a York newspaper, denouncing "traffic in human flesh." On the same manhood he inherited a fortune, whereupon he resolved to devote his life to negro emancipation. He was the first identified with the question. In 1780 he presented a petition to the House of Commons, and year after year pressed the cause, and aided it with his purse and pen. It was he who brought forward the motion in the House of Commons, in 1789, but it was not until 1807 that the Abolition Bill passed the House of Lords. Sir Samuel Romilly had spoken in favour of the feelings of Napoleon, and his greatness, with those of that individual who would lay down upon his pillow, and remember that the slave trade was no more. The slaves were not set free at once as they were bound to serve their masters as apprentices for five years. In 1833, £20,000,000 was granted to slave owners as compensation. Wilberforce lived only long enough to see the triumph of his life's work for he died on July 29th, in London, and his remains were buried with a public funeral in Westminster Abbey. Some time before his death he said: "God that I have lived to witness the day in which England is willing to give twenty millions sterling for the abolition of slavery." Being deeply pious, he published a regular system of the prevailing religious system of Professing Christians, and an "Apology for the Christian Sabbath." He had a large family, of whom Samuel Wilberforce, of Oxford, and afterwards of Exeter, became very celebrated. He had sons in the clerical profession.

### Mesopotami.

Great Britain has decided that Mesopotamia as a British territory is too expensive. It has been estimated that it costs the British Government to keep the necessary forces in Mesopotamia. It is now estimated that these expenses to not exceed two million pounds by the year. If all goes well, shall revive the commerce and prosperity of the great of the caliphs. The Emir Feisal, the King of the Hejaz, whom the British would not permit to occupy the throne of a restored Syria, is likely to be the sovereign of the new State. The circumstances surrounding the establishment of the Kingdom of Mesopotamia will naturally make it a great Britain, and probably the Mohammedans in India will be completely disposed toward British rule in consequence of this tacit consent of Arab ambitions in Mesopotamia.

Clare Sheridan, the plucky sculptor, who went to Moscow to busts of Lenin and other Bolshevik leaders, is an enthusiastic motorist. He was taken to a sack and taken in an automobile to a spot near the business of the city and dumped out on the street. Archbishop Brown, who is the subject, declared that he had been taken to police headquarters that he who seized him "told me I had preaching social equality to the negroes and that as this was the doctrine was not tolerated, and that he who preached it is threatened with death."
