RELICS OF ENEMY SUBMARINE.

Relics of an enemy submarine, sent articles in the collection is a German torpedo minus the head. The torpedo is over six feet long and is of 20 inches diameter in its thickest part. The machinery which propals it is exposed to view and the whole thing is very interesting, showing as it does the ingenuity used in the contriving of in struments of destruction.
